Um, I know here. What I would like to do, just, uh, for an audio record, is to make sure that we know everybody that's in the room. Just, you know, just a general introduction. I'll start; Sergeant Brown with the Sheriff's Office.

Q1: I'm gonna say this, uh, started at 0507 on 9/13/2016. Um, here, uh, I know you probably had a chance to speak with, uh, him, uh, about this, um, so you know, um, uh, with him here, I just wanna make sure that you know that you're - you're able to, um, consult with him, which I know you've done. Uh, you're able to, uh, provide a statement or not; it's completely up to
you. You're here, uh, on your own, you know, free will. Uh, you're able to answer a question or not; it's up to you. When you wa- feel like you don't wanna, uh, partake in this anymore, w- we'll be done. You can, um, uh, end the interview. Does that, uh, make sense?

A: That does make sense, yes.

And, um, having spoken to him, um, I just wanna make sure also that, uh, you would like to actually provide a statement as to what happened, um, last night, uh, with this incident?

Okay. Do you have the form? What I do wanna start with is, because I know we've met, um, a few times, um, but I don't know much about you, admittedly; I r- I really don't. Um, and so I'd like to find out some of that information. Um, you mentioned your name, Veronica La- Laguardia?

And, um, you began FTO - eight, nine months, that would put you somewhere 2014-ish?

July, yes.

Cool. Um, do you, um, what beat were you working, I guess, tonight - last night?

Saturday, Sunday, Monday shift, which would mean that, um, the shift that we're - we're talking about now started on, uh, Monday night, correct?

Q1: Um, Saturday, Sunday, Monday, um, working night shift, um, preferring night shift, um, does that - you - you generally are able to keep up on sleep, to be able to go and - and work a night shift without mu- many problems?

A: I get plenty of hours' sleep, yes.

Um, on the average, how many hours would you say you sleep a night - a day, I guess?

A: $\quad$ Seven to eight.

Seven to eight? Wow, that is pretty good. Um, during this week, Saturday, Sunday, and then I guess prior to um, this call on Monday night, um, what kinda week would you say you had? A - a - a - a busy week? A - a slow week? Uh, how was the - how was the work week? How did that go?

A: The work week, uh, was pretty consistent with calls. Um, when we don't have many pending calls for service, then I try to be as productive as I can with self-initiated work.

Um, would you say that this week, um, there was a, um, maybe a high number of, say, in-progress calls versus, say - say, cold paper calls? Or how - how does the - the work week generally go for night shift on 12 plan?

A: Every day is different, so one night can be busier than the other night. So it's difficult to say.

A: It fluctuates.

Q1: This particular week, were there any, say, in-progress calls that, uh, maybe were a little, I don't know, uh, stood out or maybe a little higher stress than, say, some of the other calls, um, that you can sit here now and say, "Oh, I remember this call," as opposed to you know takin', like, a 5-94 report or somethin' like that?

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Is that pretty much the same story as this, you know, Monday night - Monday morning coming into m - Monday during the day yesterday? Um, pretty much the same story of I - I worked, I went home, kicked around for a little bit, slept, got up, came to work?

A: Everything was normal.

A: I'm in this sort of attire.
My magazines, my baton, my radio; everything that's in my belt.

Would that include handcuffs, OC, pretty much standard type, issued type equipment for a - a patrol shift?

Yes.

Um, your shirt, explain your shirt to me that you wore last night.
My Sheriff's Office shirt?
Yeah.
It's got a s- sheriff badges on both sides.
Q1: The patches?
The patches...
Okay.
...authorized, yes. It's a tan shirt, long sleeve.
Q1: Did you wear a jacket last night?
A: Uh, I did, and I took it off.
Q1:

Okay. Your pants?
Mm-hm.

Q1: Um, can you explain your pants?
A: My pants are green in color, and they're sheriff-authorized, approved pants.
Q1: Would that include tha- that silver stripe that...
A: It does.

Q1: ...that goes down the side?
A: Yes, it does.
Q1: Normal patrol footwear?
A: Black boots, yes.
Q1: Briefing, did you guys have briefing?
A: We did have briefing.
Q1: Do you normally have briefing on 12 plan?
A: Yes, we do.
Q1: How - how - how long is a briefing, ah, for 12 plan?
A: It depends how many calls for service we have pending, but typically 20 minutes to 30 minutes.

And how about last night?
It was approximately 20 to 30 minutes.
This being your quote-unquote Friday, unless you have a training day tomorrow, I don't know if you do or not?

This being your quote-unquote Friday, do you load and unload your vehicle every night, or does it stay loaded throughout the week?

A: It stays loaded. My vehicle stays loaded.
Q1: $\quad$ So with the briefing being 20 to 30 minutes, would it be fair to say that, uh, after briefing, you pretty much go into service?

A: Yes.
Q1:
Okay. Um, in that patrol car, ha- explain to me your patrol car. Um, w- how does it appear?

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A: It does.

I have a, uh, a bag that is seated on the passenger seat, which has my organizational - organizational folders, which include paperwork. I have a ticket book. On the floorboard, I tend to carry wipes for my hands, and various items that I need throughout the shift.

Um, what about the exterior of the vehicle?
Exterior of the we- the vehicle has the authorized Sheriff's Office logo throughout it.

Uh-huh.
Um, the exterior of the vehicle also has the push bar on the front.
All right.
S- the, uh, the lights to the vehicles as well; white lights r- and red flashing lights.

Fair to say it's a standard patrol vehicle?
Yes.

Um, nothing unusual about, say, that vehicle as opposed to, you know, the next deputy's vehicle?

No.
Does it come equipped with video, uh, dash cam type equipment?
It does have a camera.

Um, to your knowledge, it was it working...
Yes, it was.
...last night? Does that, um, video equipment, um, ha- ha- does it also come with some form of audio...

Q1: ...type recording device?
A: This one's a mic.

Q1: How does that work?
A: $\quad$ The microphone is, uh, typically carried in the, uh, center console area. It charges during the nighttime, or during when you go OD.

Mm-hm.

And you clip it onto your duty belt when you're ready to go on duty.
Q1: $\quad$ So is that where you - you wear your microphone, on your - your duty belt?
A: $\quad K-$ on the duty belt, yes.
Q1: What activates the recording or the audio, whether it's video or audio? What what octivates - activates that?

Um, are you also, ah, AR-qualified, or do you have an AR?
I do not have an AR.

Okay. Um, do you personally, um, carry any other forms of recording equipment? Body worn cameras? Do you have your personal recording device, maybe, that you carry on your person throughout your shift?

A: I don't have the body camera; I do have my department issued recorder, yes.

Oh, okay. Um, after going into service tonight, uh, I - I - I - I - I understand that at - at some point, there was this call for service that we're here to speak about now. Did you have an opportunity to do any self-initiated or radio calls for activity prior to this call coming out?

There was...
'Cause I understand it was pretty soon into your shift, right?
Yes. There was one radio call that I received as soon as I logged on, and it was for a vehicle vandalism.

Cold?
Cold, yes.
And by cold, I mean prior?
Yes.
Um, okay. Um, and that was the only...
That was the only call.
...call for service?

No selfish-nayshed - initiated vehicle stops or anything like that?
There was no time for that, no.
Um, and eventually, we - we came to this call for service.
Yes.

Do you - were you in service when this call came out, or were you still on your vandalism call?

I was on the vandalism call, and I was finishing that up when I heard...
What...
...this call come out. Yes.
This would have been in Saratoga, the vandalism call?
The - yes it was. It was o- it was on Fredericksburg.
Fredericksburg, okay. So, if you're finishing up this call, your - your vandalism call for service as this one's coming out, did you immediately begin to respond to this - this call?

Once I cleared my information with the vandalism call...

Q1: Mm-hm.
A: ...yes, I responded.
Q1: Um, and how soon after the dispatch did you clear your vandalism call?
A: When dispatch gave the information?
Q1: Yeah.
A: It was less - I would say, between...

Deputy (Reyes), 81 Sam 55, uh, responding to, um, this call. And what type of call was it?

It was a welfare check on two individuals at a residence.

Do you remember what the address was or where it was?
It was on Titus - the Street Titus.

Okay. And from Fredericksburg, how long would you say it took you after you started responding five to seven minutes later to - to arrive on Titus?

Five minutes.

Who was on scene when you arrived?
Deputy (Reyes) and Deputy (Weirock).
Deputy (Weirock) - what, uh, unit is he?
81 Henry 1.
Henry 1, I guess being the Los Santa Cruz Mountains, right?

Yes.
Was, um, and he was there prior to you?

He was.

So Deputy (Reyes) and Deputy (Weirock) were on scene, uh, and then you arrived. Um, when you arrived, um, were you able to make visual contact immediately with those two deputies?

Deputy (Reyes) was standing in the - in the front of the residence, so he was the first person I talked to on scene.

Do you remember, um, what it was that he had told you? I mean, I understand you went to, I believe you called it a welfare check, two individuals on Titus.

Yes. Yes.

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Q1: Um, what it was that he mentioned to you when you arrived?
A: $\quad$ That he was unable to make contact at the residence.
Q1: Um, did he say how he had tried to make contact?
A: He's knocked on the door.
Q1: And no response?
A: $\quad$ There was no response.
Q1: Then what happened?

A: Then I continued also attempting to knock on the door.
Q1: $\quad$ The front door?
A: The front door, yes.
Q1: Um, when you approached the front door, um, were there any cars in the driveway?

A: $\quad$ There was not. No.

Q1: Well, did you happen to notice if there was a, um, a garage door to the residence?

A: $\quad$ There was a garage door.
Q1: $\quad$ Did you notice if it was up or down?
A: It was down.

Q1: It was down?
A: Yes.

Q1: Did you, um, so as I'm going up the driveway to the residence, how - what am I looking at as I'm going up the driveway?

You're looking at a garage door which is fully down.

A: It had windows on the top of it.
Q1: Okay.
A: But you were unable to see through those specific types of windows.
Q1: You notice any lights on around the house or residence or inside, outside?
A: The only light that I saw was, um, the, uh, the sunroof area of the house.

A: There's a skylight, yes.
Q1: Okay. And so you can see a light on from the skylight?
A: Faint light coming from that.

So where's the - the front door?
The front door?

Yeah. 'Cause you mentioned a garage straight ahead.
Garage here. The front door was directly to the right...

...of the garage.
Q1: Okay. Um, I'm assuming, correct me if I'm wrong, um, as you're trying to make contact, the door is shut then?

The front door appeared to be a wooden door.

A: There was knocking. I also used my flashlight to knock on the door to create a louder sound. And it also had a knocker on the, uh, top of the door.

Yes, Sheriff's Office. Is there anybody in there?
Any - no verbal or contact?
I did not hear anything verbally, no.
Q1: Okay. Um, did you go up to the door by yourself or did (Reyes) or (Weirock) go with you?

Deputy (Reyes) was also in the same vicinity, yes.

A: $\quad$ By the door.
Q1: Um, (Weirock)?
A: (Weirock) was around the house attempting to look through anything to see any visual throughout the house.

Q1: What do you mean by around the house?
A: $\quad$ He was in the backyard.

Oh, okay. Um, at some point though there's no response?
A: There is, no. There's nothing.

So then what do you guys do?

A: Um, I went to my patrol vehicle to obtain the phone number to the reporting party to give them a call.

Okay. Uh, and did you call it?
I did call.
And who - who was that or what did they say?
It was the granddaughter.
Do you remember her name?
To the couple. I believe her name was
And what did she say?
She said that she was concerned about both her grandparents because she - she was unable to get a hold of them. She called them multiple times and was unable to speak to them.

Did she mention how long she'd been trying to get a hold of them?
Throughout the whole day.
Just today or did she say more than today or just today?
She said it was more today but she was more concerned about today specifically.

Um, did she provide a reason why she was so concerned?
Um, after I called her a second time was...

If he knows typically their hangout spots and he did inform me that the female half does go on walks, but typically during the day. During the night, she stays home.

Um, I talked to him further, uh, to see if they have a vehicle inside the house. He said yes. It's typically kept in the garage. And I also asked him if he knew of anyone that could assist us with trying to get a hold of (Eugene) and his wife. And he did provide a phone number and he dialed the phone number on his personal cell phone.

Was this to Eugene and his wife or to somebody else?

A: $\quad \mathrm{He}$ - spoke - spoke to first and asked him via the telephone if he knew where they could be. And stated that they should be at the house. Their routine is pretty straightforward so. And then he passed the phone along to me and I spoke to him fur-, uh, further.

A: $\quad$ He said their - their routine is pretty straightforward. Sometimes the elderly lady goes on walks throughout the day or during the day. She returns and typically (Eugene) stays home and sleeps a lot of the day since he's had a heart issues in the past.

A: $\quad \mathrm{He}, \mathrm{uh}, \quad$ did express concern about their prior dinner, which was, uh, they typically have dinner every Wednesday.

A: And he did mention a concerning conversation that he heard (Eugene) have with his wife.

And what did he say about that conversation?
While they were at dinner, (Eugene)'s wife was going to grab something inside the vehicle. Uh, (Eugene) was somewhere around the vehicle and did not like his wife's, um, how long she was taking to grab. I believe he referred to it as a gift. (Eugene) yelled at her, and something - something along the lines of, "If you don't hurry up, I'm going to bash your head against the trunk." So, did express some concern and at one point, he said he was concerned about murder-suicide in regards to (Eugene) hurting his wife and also himself.

He did mention in the past that he - that (Eugene) does constantly harp and yell at. I don't know her specific name. I just know at his wife. And he did mention that she takes it. She doesn't say anything back.

Did he mention anything about, um, other than what you expressed already, any - any specific threats about harming or killing or anything like that?

The spec- the threat that he did mention was him with the trunk, hitting her with the trunk.

Would you say he seemed pretty concerned then?
By the way his - the tone of his voice, definitely, yes.
So what did - so what did you think now, uh, about trying to make contact at this house?

I believe that it was pretty - pretty important that we try to get a hold of someone immediately.

All right. Um, was there anything more in this conversation with (Jim), uh, that you had?

I got off the phone with him and I did tell him if we - if we could further talk and if he would be available.

All right.
He said yes. I also talked to the neighbor a little bit further.
And did he provide any further information? Pertinent information?
Uh, I asked (Steven) if he knew about guns in the household. And he said he was not sure of guns, but he did know that (Eugene) was prior military.

A: I gave the in- information to my partners, Deputy (Reyes) and Deputy (Weirock).
