So, uh, you know you're - you can leave at any time, you're not obligated to talk to us, totally volunteer statement. Um, we just wanna hear your side of the story, that's it.

Okay. Um, all right, cool. Maybe you can just, uh, talk me through your employment here at the Sheriff's office. When you got hired, uh, what your current assignment is, maybe some background...

I got hired in December 2002. I did, um, my background is I did - I think I'm at like eight years Patrol time and the rest in courts. I'm now currently assigned to West Valley Patrol, my second year.

Okay. Um, prior to working here at the Sheriff's office, did you have any law enforcement experience? Paid or unpaid?

Uh, no.
Weren't a volunteer or anything like that?

How about, um, any college courses related to criminal justice?
Uh, um, let me - let me think. No, I did not.
No degree in criminal justice, nothing like that?
No.
Okay. Um, so you went to Patrol, sorry I'm backtracking a little bit.
That's okay.
You went to Patrol for a little bit. Uh, how long did you do, um, Patrol your first assignment?

My first tour was like three years maybe, a little bit over three years.
Okay, and where was that time at?
First one was, I did one year in - I think one and a half years South County, and then I moved up to Central.

Okay. And then after that, those three years, what did you do?
Those three years I went back to courts, and then I came back out. Not sure if it was one or two years that first time, and then I came back out, and then I was on, uh, I started in Central and ended up on the East side.

Okay. And how long did you work Patrol during that tour assignment?
I think that was - I think that second tour was, uh, right at three years.

Um, I went to courts for, I think I was in courts for two months and then, uh, I ruptured my achilles, and I was out for a year.

And then I went back to courts for like, I think it was a year and then now I'm here in West Valley.

Okay, and how long have you been at West Valley Patrol?
Since the start of last year, so January 2015 to now.
Okay, and what is your - what shift do you work now?
Um, uh, 12 swings.
12 swings. So you work Saturday, Sunday, Monday, uh, during the evening evening hours?

1800 to 0630 .
Okay. All right, and what, um, what's your assignment on that team?
Uh, pa- Patrol.
Like, uh, I'm - I'm sorry like beat are you assigned a certain beat?
Uh, we just switched. So now I'm in Saratoga.
Okay. Um, and when did that start?

What, uh, me going to Saratoga? Um, this is probably like two weeks, three weeks.

Two or three weeks?
Yeah. Maybe three weeks ago.
Okay, and prior to that, were you assigned to...
I was in Cupertino.
Cupertino, okay. All right. Um, you haven't worked for any of the law enforcement agencies. Uh, was this - and then - so, yesterday was your normal shift?

And what time did you get up?
Probably around 2:00.
Okay, so slept from 8:00 am to 2:00 pm on Monday?
Mm-hm.

And then started your shift at 6:00.
6:00, yeah.
Okay, perfect. Um, uh, your assignment yesterday, what were you wearing?
What was I wearing? Oh, um, class A.
Class A uniform?
Yeah.
Uh, short sleeve or long sleeve?
Long sleeve.
Long sleeve, uh, just a standard patrol duty uniform?
Patrol and the green pants, yeah.
Okay. Can you tell me about your, um, duty belt and how you have that configured? What's on your- what do you wear on your duty belt?

Um, all the equipment that was issued to me.
Okay, so, uh, what type of - what type of handgun?
It's a Glock, uh, 17.

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And three extra, okay. Um, how many handcuffs do you carry?
Uh, on my belt, two.
Two? Are they in the same cuff or are they diff- two different cuffs - cases?
They're - they're in different. There's one in the front and one in the back.
Okay, so one cuff in the front one in the back. Are you right-handed or left-

Uh, the handcuff cases where are they on your duty belt? Right side or left

They're - oh, the front one's on the right side, the back one's on the left side.
Okay, cool. And you carry your - you said you're left-handed, so do you carry your gun on your left side?

Okay. Um, all right. And...
Real quick?

Uh, uh, do you, uh, tell me how you pump up your mags? How many rounds?
They're fully loaded.
handed?

Cool. Um, all right. And you started your shift yesterday at 6:00 and then the event that we're going to talk about happened, uh, at some point after that.

Yeah, time of the call was 1949 I think.
Okay. When you started your shift yesterday, did you attend a briefing?
Um, yes.
Okay. Do you remember how long that was?
It was a short one because we were busy. Ten, maybe 15 minutes.
Okay, short briefing, um, and then you pretty much go 10-8 and start...
Yeah.
...handling - handling calls. Okay, do - were you busy, uh, handling calls for service up to the time of this incident?

Yeah, busy, and then I think there were calls pending after this one.
Okay, so it was a fairly busy shift?
Yeah.
Okay. Fair enough, um, maybe walk - walk me through and - and specifically related to this incident that happened maybe from the beginning. Just tell me what happened in your own words.

Um, from the call?
Sure, the time you got dispatched or made - or even aware that this call came out. What you know about the call...

Q: ...and just tell me in your own words and after that I'll come back and ask more...

A:
It came out as a welfare check on an elderly male on, um, uh, the address. So I was helping, uh, Deputy Laguardia on a - it was like, uh, someone keyed his car, so like a vandalism. So I left to go to this welfare check. It was called in by, um, I think a relative from out of state. So Weyhrauch's actually there first. Um, I saw him walking up, looking in the door. So I, uh, I go up and go, "Hey, what do you - what do you think?" He said, "Well, I knocked on the door, I think maybe I heard someone inside moving, saying something, but I'm not sure. Now they're not saying anything." So, um, knocked on all the front windows, banged on the door a little bit. That was like a couple minutes. And I had, um, I remember specifically having radio call again while we're standing there, so I can hear it ringing. So they called and it - they said it kept ringing. I couldn't hear it inside. I was trying to listen for it, but no one picked up. Um, no ring. Uh, Deputy Weyhrauch goes into the side gate trying to look like you know in the back windows. So it's locked, so I think he scaled it. He went over a chain link fence. Um, and then I went to the neighbor's house to see, hey have you seen this guy. Neighbor comes out - I didn't get his name neighbor comes out and goes, "Yeah there's an elderly couple that lives there." And, um, he said that, "He was afraid something might have happened." I said, "Why?" "Because well he's elderly he doesn't walk and, um, they weren't doing so hot. The last time I saw him..." I think he said it was on the weekend. And I said, "Well there's a green garbage can outside. He goes, "Okay let me ask my wife." He asked the wife. Wife comes out and goes, "Oh yeah that must have been put - the green garbage can must've put - been put there after 4:00 today." Because that's when she saw it. I'm like, okay cool, so we have a timeline. Um, and then he goes, "Wait let me - I have a key." And then I'm like, "Okay, let me see the key." He goes, but he said that, uh, "The guy changed his locks and reinforced the door, so the key probably won't work." So I said, "Well, you know, we'll give it a shot, whatever." So I told - I went back, and I told (Don) what we had, and he goes, well, let's, uh, and then at that time, I'm sorry, (Veronica) got there and then, well, I told her, this is what we have, and then she's like, "Well, let's call the RP again and see, tell her what's going on." So she calls, I don't know, she walked away, she was on the phone. I was trying to formulate a game plan of how we're going to kind of see if they're home, or they're out to dinner. We kind of had like - like a little conversation. Well, maybe someone picked them up. And so the neighbor said, "There's a guy that comes every Wednesday. His name is They have dinner together every Wednesday." And I said, "Okay, can you call him?" And he calls him. And I think the gist of it was the last time he saw him was that Wednesday they had - they had dinner. They're, um, I remember
asking him, "Hey, why does he hang out with them every Wednesday?" He said, "Well, they're old - old war buddies, and they just swap stories." Okay, that's cool. So he hangs up with him, and then we go try the key. The key doesn't work. It doesn't even fit in the lock. And so I called, uh, I called Sergeant (Ulrich). I'm like, "Hey, this is what we have. Um, can you swing by here?" He's like, "Yeah, okay, I'll - I'll come over there where it's..." So he comes by. We try to formulate a game plan. Uh, let me back up. So the neighbor goes, "Hey, they only have one car. It's in the garage if it's there." And so we - you can - you can peek in the garage through a side window, the car's there. So we're like, well, um, let's try the other neighbor. So I went to the one to the right. I forgot his name. I think it's like or something. And he goes, "Oh yeah, I don't really see him I just got back from Europe and here's their home phone number you can try it." So, um, it's the same number that radio has, so that's kind of useless, so I didn't really try it again. So, um, we formulate a plan at one point I think I don't know what (Veronica) got from the RP we ran out, uh, Deputy Weyhrauch ran out the guy for like did a firearms' history check on him, and he comes back with like I don't know I had like six or seven, eight handguns in there. And then, um, so we - we kind of pulled it back in the street and then someone drove up I'm not sure his friends drove up it was a - a lady and an older gentleman I didn't get their names, and he said, "Well we haven't heard from them but, um, we're here to visit." I guess they came over unexpectedly, um, so I went, "Okay well can you try to call them?" So I think they tried to call another line I'm not sure. I I didn't talk to those guys I didn't even get their names. So by that time we're like well no one's heard from them. We go back up to the door, and we're just - just pounding on it. I mean we're really pounding on it windows we, um, we got into the backyard that the neighbor had a key for the backyard gate, so we didn't have to scale it. So we got back there we pound on all the - it's all, um, what do you call it? Sliding glass doors, so we pounded all those no answer, nothing. So I don't know if the light went on and off it was kind of like it was getting dusk, so I don't know if it was on or off and then the neighbor said, "Well it's probably - it was on, but it turned - or it was off, but he turned on because it's on a timer. He keeps it on a timer." Is what he told us. I'm like, "Oh okay cool." So one of them went on and off, and possibly I wasn't sure, so we're banging on all the doors around the house nothing back there no answer, um, so we go up to the front and this decision was made to force entry into the house. So we drove, uh, well because he had guns, so we drove a ballistic car up there with the doors open. I drove it up to the driveway I mean you guys saw it that's where it was, um, we hit the front door first I mean it wouldn't break open because it's reinforced I mean it didn't even move. Um, I think Sergeant (Ulrich) kicked it like five or six times, and then we wait a little bit, and then he put out we couldn't get - make entry in the front, so we
went around to the back the garage door which was not reinforced and, um, he was at the door I was stacked up next to him and the two other deputies were at the car so - but when we wen- transitioned to the back Sergeant (Ulrich) went first then Deputy Weyhrauch, then Deputy Laguardia then I took the back by the time I came around the corner he already entered the - they already entered the garage and I don't know if they broke the second door open but, um, when I made it into the garage all I can hear was, "Drop the gun, drop the gun, drop the gun." A few seconds later, um, shots were fired.

Okay. Um, that's really helpful. That - that provides like a huge like overall global thing. And we'll go back and maybe ask - I'll ask more pointed...

Okay. Yeah.
...questions, but - but that's really super helpful. What happened after you, um, you heard the shots were fired? What happened next?

So shots were fired. Um, the elderly wife was kind of like, when I - when I got around, she was kind of like hovering over him. And then I don't think she knew what was going on. Because she was like, "What happened? What happened?" So all I saw was Deputy ver- uh, Deputy Laguardia take her. And I said, "Hey, just get her outside." So we took her out. Deputy Weyhrauch went inside to secure, because the house wasn't clear. So he - he stood behind me to provide security. And I was, uh, running first aid.

Okay, and tell - tell me about that.
A:
Um, well, when I got there, there was a male on the ground laying face up. His hands were, I don't know, his hands were like this. There was a, looked like a small revolver at his feet. Um, I saw an entrance wound to the top of his chest, and then I believe there was one on the side here. So, um, none of us had a - a quick-lock - lock, uh, bandage. So I went outside and grabbed one. I think Deputy (Harper) was there at the scene. He did, uh, I got one from him. I went back in and I, um, it was myself and I think Sergeant (Owens) was in there, and we were, uh, trying to stop the bleeding.

So I held it there, I don't know, couple - a minute maybe and then paramedics arrived.

Well, we staged them.

So, um, they got there, and they took over that and, um, that's when everyone arrived. They took him away and, uh, while I was there actually giving aid, it was Deputy Weyhrauch and another deputy, um, secured the house with - for people, there was no one else there. That was it.

Okay, and then, um, and then the older gentleman got transported?
He got transported.
Okay, and, um, and then what happened?
Um, well we stayed in the house for a little bit. Um, they told us to get out of the house. They were taking pictures and then sit by in the street.

Okay, and then at some point you were - you went from the scene I - I believe to West Valley Patrol?

Yeah.
And then you were there for a while and then from West Valley Patrol you came here?

Yes.
And to headquarters and now here we are? Okay, and if at any point today like I say something that isn't accurate like cause I'm just paraphrasing.

Mm-hm.
Just say no, Josh you're wrong. That's not what happened and then just clarify.
Okay.

Cool. Um, all right, again that was super helpful like I really appreciate like you were able to just articulate everything. So I really appreciate that. Um, prior to yesterday, had you ever been to that house before?

No.
Prior to yesterday, had you ever had contact with the male, the elderly male who was shot?

No.
Prior to yesterday, had you ever had contact with the elderly female that was at the house?

No.
Okay. And - and prior to yesterday, had you ever had contact with any of the involved parties that were, uh, involved in the incident yesterday?

Uh, like deputies.
No. I'm sorry, uh...

Oh just...
The people that showed up in the car, the - the neighbors.
Oh, oh, yeah- no. I've never seen them before.
No. You had no contact with any...
No.
...of those people ever before? Okay. Um, okay, so, uh, who were the fi- you were one of the initial units to get dispatched?

Yes, I think I was the first one to get dispatched.
Okay, you get dispatched, and then it sounds like Weyhrauch got dispatched? Or did he just...

A: I - he didn't get dispatched. I think he just showed up to help.

Okay, so it was a solo unit response?

Yeah, because there's only three of us.
Okay, and then him just being a good partner...
Yeah.
...being a partner, he's like, hey, I'm just going to go show up?
He went and - yeah, and he actually got there first.
Okay. And do you know how long he was there before you arrived?
Um, I got there pretty quick, because I was down the street, so at the most maybe a couple minutes.

I parked, um, I actually parked in front of him. Uh, I think it was a little bit front. So he was on the curb. And I was in the street because I usually take the streets. So we have room to move.

Okay, so you like parked next to him?
Yes, like next to him.
In the - in the road way?
Kind of offset, yeah.
Okay, cool. Um, so he's already up near the front, uh, either the front door or the driveway area, you get out of your car, and you go, uh, what - what happened? You went walking up there to...

I went to see, um, what he did, what he was doing, and he said, well, he said, "I knocked on it and I think I heard someone inside and moving around, but now there's nothing."

And - and did he tell you how that happened? Did he - did he say he knocked on the door or tapped on the window?

Yeah, he knocked on it.
Knocked on the front door?

Okay, did he say how many times that person said it?
Just one time.
And did - what else did he say about he thought he heard something? Did he elaborate?

One time? Did he say anything else about what the person sounded like in terms of in age or where they were? And...

No, he just - he just told me it sounded like a male voice, but he wasn't sure.
Okay. Um, all right. And so, uh, now you're there with him. And did you guys try knocking on the door again?

Mm-hm. Yes.
How many times did you knock on the door? Or did you see Weyhrauch knock on the door?

I don't know how many times I did, but we probably knocked on it for a good 10 to 15 minutes.

Oh that long?
Yeah, because we went like window, to window, to door, to window, and then we're kind of like, you know how you can kind of peek under the blinds? We saw a light and there's a - he has a skylight and the light was on so.

Yeah. Coming out and the neighbor - at that time it was already dark, so the neighbor's like, "Well it's probably on a timer because that's what he puts on a timer."

The interior lights?

Okay, all right, um, and all that contact that you were doing during that 10 or 15 minutes, you and Weyhrauch were doing, it was all centered in the front of the house, the front windows, the front door?

Um, yes, well, he went to the back by himself.
Okay.
And I was in the front and then we kind of regrouped, came back together and kind of formulated a game plan.

Okay, um, when he went to the back, and he came back up, did he give you like a briefing on what he...

Yeah, he said, "There's - you can't see anything. Everything was shut and there was no answer."

Okay, the - he said the blinds were shut or?
All the drapes and - yeah, they're - they're actually like curtains.
Curtains he said they were shut?
Yeah.

Couldn't see anything?
Can't see anything.
Okay. And then at some point, uh, there was you asked dispatch to make the calls into the house.

Mm-hm.
And they did, they said they did. But you didn't...
They said they did. But I didn't - I just did that, so I can hear if it's ringing.
Okay.
And they said, "It just kept ringing." But I couldn't hear anything.

Q: Okay, couldn't hear the phone. All right, and then at some point, I think you said you talked to the neighbors that were too - if you're facing the house...

The neighbors to the left.
...if you look to the left.
I talked to both, but the first one I went to was the one that left.
Okay, tell me more about that interaction.
Uh, well, he answered the door, and he's friendly. He's like, "Oh yeah, um, there's an elderly couple that lives there. He's - he's got some medical problems. He doesn't - he just kind of sleeps a lot and, um, but the wife is more active because she goes on walks." And I said, "Well, do you think they're sleeping? They just don't hear the door?" He goes, "Well, if she heard the door, she would probably answer it. Because she's active, and she's like, she's not..." And he said that, "The male was, uh, the one with more medical problems." I said, "Okay." I said, "Hey, do you know, that's when I asked about the car." He said, "Yeah, that one silver..." I think it was an Altima. "If it's there, it's not in the driveway, it's in the garage." So, um, and then I went over like, "Hey, do you have a key? Maybe we can get in." And they gave us a key. It didn't work. Um, yeah that's about it.

Okay, were those - were those the neighbors that told you about the garbage can being put out there after 4:00 pm?

A: Yeah, I asked, well I said, "Hey, is - when is your garbage day?" He said, "It's today, meaning today." And I said, "Well, he's got a green can out there." He goes, well, he went and talked to his wife, and the wife said that, "She didn't see the garbage can that morning, but she saw it after 4:00." So we were able to kind of narrow it down to when they were home.

Still don't hear anything?
goes over there, he open up. Nothing, no

Nothing and he actually, um, went to every window, and he actually opened the lock for us, so we didn't have to jump the fence to the backyard. He walked back there with us, and he actually tried pulling on all the doors and knocking on the doors and nothing.

Okay. So all the doors are locked?
All the doors are locked, yeah.
Okay. Um, describe to me the condition of all the - I know you said they were all locked, but I'm just gonna go through them just one by one.

There's the back garage door that I think was eventually kicked open.
Mm-hm.
That one was locked when you guys first went back there?
Yes.
Um, there's a slider as you - as you go past the garage door and continue going in the backyard. I believe there's a slider. There's like three or four sliders I think.

Okay three or four sliders?
Yeah.

They're all locked?
They're all locked. He was pulling on them, we were tugging on them. We were actually banging on it.

Okay. Um, the - you said they were, I think, did you say draped or blind or curtains?

A: I think they're - they looked like drapes or curtain you know the - they're not plaited the - the cloth ones.

Yeah. The ones that hang down?
Yeah. Yeah. Yeah.
Okay, those are all closed?
They're all closed.
And you can't see in?
We tried to peek underneath, but all you can - you can't - you couldn't see anything.

Okay, uh, condition of the lights in the house at that point, were the lights on or off?

Um, you could see one like a faint light peeking through, um, but it wasn't bright. It looked dark.

We came back to the front and then, um, that's when we decided to call the supervisor.

Okay, how much - how long do you think you'd been at the scene at that - at that point before you guys notified the supervisor?

Okay, long time.

Long time, all right, at some point you guys, I think you said you had contact with the neighbors on the right-hand side.

The other side. Yeah.
Tell - tell me more about that.
So I went over there myself, and I, um, just - just to try anything. So he came out after a while. He said, "We just got back from Europe. Um, we haven't seen him for a while." And, um, he gave me the landline number. But it was the same number that we had. So and I said, "Thank you." And...

That was it.
Yeah. That was it. It was real brief because he was like in his robe (unintelligible).

Okay, you went over there by yourself to talk to him?
Yeah.
Okay, and do you remember his name?
I think it's either - it's on his door. I remember it being a or a It's either one of those for sure.

Okay, but it's immediate neighbor, right next door?
It's immediate to the right, yeah.
Okay, and then I think you said at one point, one of the neighbors told you that the ma- the elderly male had a difficult time walking. Do you remember, uh, what - did you say that or am I mishearing things?

Um, I think he had some medical problems. I don't know if he had a difficult time walking.

Was it, um, what did you think he meant? Cause I - I think I know what you're saying, but I...

Well I thought he meant that they were probably in the house dead.
Okay, like something medically...

And then, uh, he goes, "Okay, I'll be right over." I said, "Hey can you swing by?" He goes, "Yeah, I'll be right over."

At the most I talked to him maybe tops 10 minutes.

Okay, and, uh, you're done talking to him, and you come - you - you went back to the - to the house and what - what happened then?

A: Uh, I said, "Hey, this - this guy has the same number that we have. He just got back from vacation. This is what we have."

Okay. And - and what did - what did the Sergeant say?
So I guess they reformulated a plan that, um, we were going to drive up the SUV because it's got the new ballistic panels up to the front of the house and then make contact at the front door.

Okay. Um, all right. And that was a decision that was mad- that was formulated by the - the group, but concurred upon by the Sergeant. You guys all said this is what we're going to do?

Yeah, the - the spotlights were in the windows.
Uh, both spotlights?
Two spotlights were on. I know one - I put one of them into the - there's a window, two windows to the left of the front door and I know the other one was at the - either at the front door or - or at the window beside it.

Okay, and I think I know why you did that, but maybe just so it's completely clear, why did you do that?

Um, so I could see who's coming to the door.
Okay. So for would it be safe to say you did it for like a tactical consideration or an officer safety consider...

A: Yeah, just to, um, just for our safety, I could see who's coming out, and it'd be hard for them to see us.

Okay, at that m - at that point when you're driving the car up there, tell me about your mindset. Are you - were you nervous, were you scared? I know you're a very seasoned - seasoned officer.

But what was your mindset?
No. My mindset was I - I was thinking maybe he's asleep and if we hit the door hard enough maybe he'll come out, or maybe he might be dead in there, so we'll have to just, I mean, force entry and see.

Okay, any concern or fear at that point that he's gonna come out and be assaultive?

Um, I - yeah, I mean, cause we - he had a lot of firearms and like the neighbor said he was an old military guy. So I mean that was in the back of my mind. So that's why we had, you know, that's why I brought the car up and everyone had their gear on.

Okay. Um, all right, cool. That's - that's all helpful stuff. So then, um, car gets parked. What happens next? Who goes up to the door?

Car gets parked, uh, Sergeant (Ulrich) goes first, he's to the left of the door. Um, Deputy Weyhrauch actually comes back around to my left and the gate, so he covers the gate. And so I get - I put it in park, I get out of the driver's seat and I go up, uh, behind Sergeant - Sergeant (Ulrich).

Okay, and, uh...
And...
Weyhrauch was covering the gate?
Yeah, because there's a gate too. I mean, we're probably - I think he - he was thinking that what if he came out the gate. Back door.

What - what about Deputy Laguardia? Where is she at?
She was at - she stayed at the - she stayed at the vehicle at the passenger side. And she was just - I think she was watching the front windows.

Okay, and, um, did you - did you guys have your handguns out?
Um, they did, I did not at that time.
Okay. So Sergeant (Ulrich) had his handgun out?
Um, I think he had it initially, and then he probably put it away when he kicked the door. I - I can't tell you for sure.

Okay. Fair enough. You did not have yours out at that point?

A: I was not holding my handgun. No.
Okay and if you remember la- uh, Laguardia, was she - did she have a handgun out?

A: I - I couldn't see.
Okay and, um, uh, the other deputy, your partner, he - you said he had an AR15 rifle?

He - did he have that slung towards the front or was it over his shoulder or something?

No it was in the front.
In the front so he had the rifle in his hands?

Don't hear anything. Um, I kind of peeked through the blinds. It kind of looked like the lights were still on. No movement.

No change. Okay, uh, so you stay there for that period of time, then - then what happened?

Um, I remember him putting out the front door was, um, we were unable to get in, it was a steel reinforced door. Um, we were gonna to try the garage.

Okay, all right. Was the, um, was the front door did it - there's a security gate there right? A security door like a bird cage?

No, there's no bird cage. It's just a solid - it's just a solid door.

Um, I don't know if you've seen the layout, but there's two, there's a wooden fence and there's a chain link fence inside. They get through that, um, and then they make entry into the garage, uh, by - they broke the - it was like a wooden door.

Okay, and you - you didn't see how that got broken?
No, by the time I came around both fences, they were already inside the garage.

I did hear it, but I didn't...
What it sounded like someone kicking it?

Kicking the door, okay. And you didn't see it But is it safe to say that was to your knowledge was that, uh, Sergeant (Ulrich) that kicked that door because he was still in the lead? Or you just...

Yeah, when I came around the corner, they're actually making entry into the second inner door.

How long do you think it took before - by the time that the - the exterior door got kicked to the time the interior door into the garage - from the garage into the house got breached?

Between the first breach and the second breach? Uh, I don't know. I'd have to guess, uh, it was quick like 10 seconds, maybe.

Yeah, because it - I think it was just like a little padlock or a little lock. So it was breached first and then they kind of all stacked into that doorway and then the second one was breached.

I - I wasn't - I - they were - I think they were all yelling commands. And like I'm assuming it was Deputy Weyhrauch because he was the - he was the one

Okay, so, uh, tell me where everyone is in the garage like explain that to me.
So - so - so I don't know. I could draw it for you.

It's a really small doorway. Can you guys see - can you see it?

This is transaction, um, they get here to this point. I can see them. Yelling commands, drop the gun, drop the gun. I turn and face this way just to make sure no one backdoor-ed us. I turn back around. And it's already shots fired.

So, yeah, she runs - she goes by me with her, comes out this way, and then out this way. Um, Deputy Weyhrauch enters. Um, he's down here. He enters this way. I follow him in. I think, um, Sergeant stayed out here. So I rendered aid here, and he was actually behind me just watching my back.

Okay. Um, and you already described how you're rendering aid, but you said that you saw, and again, if I'm wrong, just tell me I'm wrong.

But I think I thought you said that there was a - a - a bullet wound in his upper right chest area?

He had a blood - I mean you could see it, it was bleeding through his shirt. And then, um, I'm assuming it went through and through since there was blood coming out of his back, back here. And then I saw like a, I think it was either a grazing shot or a through and through shot here on his like lower rib cage.

Okay. And, um, what - how did you render aid to him?

And you're over the top of him providing aid?

Um, they were kind of locked too. There was like a little pin down there, and we don't want to really mess with the door. So, um, when fire took him away, that's when everyone else came in.
