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Q: I'm Sergeant Brown, like the color Brown. I work with the Sheriff's Office. I'm an investigator, okay? What's your name?

Q: What cell are you in?

A: Uh, cell 13. No, yeah, 13.

Q: Sure?

A: Yeah.

Q: Do you know why we're here?

A: Yeah.

Q: Did you get up and, uh, take a look outside this morning?

A: Yeah.

Q: Did you see me there?

43 A: Uh...

44

45 Q: Do you remember?

46

47 A: Yeah.

48

49 Q: Do you wanna tell me what happened?

50

51 A: Yeah.

52

53 Q: Cool. Tell me.

54

55 A: Well, I can't say I had a eye view, but I could tell you what I overheard when

56 the deputies came in the house...

57

58 Q: Check this thing out right here, look. That's 13 right there, right?

59

60 A: Yeah.

61

62 Q: That's you, 39, so you're - you got somewhat of a view, right?

63

64 A: No, y- 'cause you don't understand...

65

66 Q: That pillar and...

67

68 A: And that...

69

70 Q: ...the stairs?

71

72 A: Yeah, pillar. It looks small, but it's really big.

73

74 Q: Yeah, it is.

75

76 A: Okay. But I can tell you that these cops, them three in particular...

77

78 Q: You know their names?

79

80 A: Yes, (Lubrum), Flore- (Flores), I believe, and (Rodriguez). Okay, they're

81 known for coming in our pod and beating up - we call them \_\_\_\_\_, but

82 they're really mentally ill, the people that's not all the way there. The people

83 that does stuff like accidentally piss on theyself, shit on theyself. Might even

84 yell at cops, calling, "Fuck you, pigs, bitches." But th- we all know, even the

85 regular deputies know, they're not all there, so every deputy and even inmates  
86 that think they're bad asses give 'em that pass, like, "All right, you nutter." But  
87 these three cops come in and they try to use us to intimidate the like,  
88 "Hey go tell them to be quiet, and I'll let y'all get a longer program," or "Hey,  
89 go do this and I give you a longer program." These cops are known for going  
90 in there and searching our cells and beatin' up the mentally able cats - not - I  
91 can't say really beatin' them up, but restraining them for no reason, physically  
92 restraining, twisting our wrist, grabbing us, slamming our face into the wall.  
93 Like this, I got this a couple of months ago. Th- that don't matter. But they're  
94 known for doing that. I called y'all this morning. You probably get my  
95 message. I called this morning as soon as I came off of program, too. I left a  
96 message on the phone (unintelligible)..  
97

98 Q: Who'd you call?  
99

100 A: Internal affairs.  
101

102 Q: Uh, Sheriff's Office IA?  
103

104 A: Yes.  
105

106 Q: Okay?  
107

108 A: I left 'em - I left a message. I said - I gave 'em my name...  
109

110 Q: Talking about - well, uh, talking about this incident or something else?  
111

112 A: This incident.  
113

114 Q: Okay. All right. That's all I want to know, that's all I want.  
115

116 A: So, I called and let them know about this incident, but them three c- cops are  
117 known for that. So, this last night, when they were doing cell searches, I was  
118 making up my covers and stuff...  
119

120 Q: Let me start with this, that guy 30 - in 39, Uh, we- ho- how long you  
121 been in B?  
122

123 A: I've been there since March.  
124

125 Q: So, you've been in there the whole time he's been in there?  
126

127 A: Yeah.  
128  
129 Q: W- tell me about him.  
130  
131 A: He keeps to hisself.  
132  
133 Q: Mm.  
134  
135 A: You - you - you- you got - you got different categories of  
136  
137 Q: Right.  
138  
139 A: You got the that might sock you...  
140  
141 Q: Right.  
142  
143 A: ...you never know what. You got the that just don't, like, that just  
144 shower - that don't - that don't just mess with nobody, stay to theyselves,  
145 they're quiet but you can tell they're not there. He's one of them. He's one of  
146 the that we all, like, we don't like because they fuck up our  
147 dorm, they stink, they don't shower. But he's one of the that we all  
148 give food to.  
149  
150 MAN: (Unintelligible)...  
151  
152 A: We all look out for (unintelligible). We feel bad for him. You got you  
153 don't feel bad for, like, "Oh, you smoke. You smoked crack too much, that's  
154 why you like that." But you got that's born that way. And me, for one,  
155 I can honestly say, I feel - I used to always feel bad for dude just off of the  
156 fact that he stinks a lot. So, I'll give him my extra tray...  
157  
158 MAN: (Unintelligible)...  
159  
160 A: ...a (unintelligible) if I got one, coffee, he like coffee. He's one of them  
161 that everybody likes, even the deadbeats.  
162  
163 Q: He'd check the trash, right?  
164  
165 A: Huh?  
166  
167 Q: He would check the trash?  
168

169 A: Yeah, he would check the trash for food. So, we'd all be like, "Hey man, get  
170 out of there," huh? That's what I mean. He's one of them You know,  
171 you got some we just don't like...  
172

173 Q: So, people kind of looked out for him?  
174

175 A: Yeah.  
176

177 Q: Okay. How did (Lubrum) treat him?  
178

179 A: (Lubrum) treat all (JCats) the same. He - he's disrespectful. Like - like, jokes  
180 about 'em, laughs at 'em. He's - you know, you got them cops that straight  
181 dicks that nobody likes, and he's one of them. Like, he's just, like - like - I  
182 never had an incident with (Lubrum). Never, like, never got written up by  
183 him. But I could see a bully, and that's what he is. He's a bully. He's a - he's a  
184 bully with a badge. That's all he is.  
185

186 Q: Did you ever see hi- one of the others was (Rodriguez), right?  
187

188 A: Yeah.  
189

190 Q: Did you ever see him interact with -- do you know the guy's name?  
191

192 A: Wi- (Tyree).  
193

194 Q: (Tyree). Did you ever see him interact with him?  
195

196 A: No, he only comes in to do cell searches.  
197

198 Q: Mm-hm.  
199

200 A: But the guy, (Rodriguez), like, you - you could just fee- give off the energy,  
201 like, what type of like, like when the cop comes in, well, we're inmates, so we  
202 can tell weird energy. Like, hey, if I can approach this cop and ask for this,  
203 and would he - would - are we gonna get program from this guy? We can feed  
204 off the energy. Like when he comes in and do s- our cell searches, your feet  
205 gotta touch the wall. He's pushing you on your back, he's grabbing your pants.  
206 He's roughing you up, saying like, "Yeah, you piece of shit." That's what they  
207 call us because we're PCs.  
208

209 Q: And the third guy?  
210

211 A: (Flores).  
212  
213 Q: Bi-...  
214  
215 A: S- same - sa-...  
216  
217 Q: ...big white guy?  
218  
219 A: Yeah. Same attitude.  
220  
221 Q: Blond, muscular?  
222  
223 A: Yeah. Same attitude, like - like, I done seen him on multiple occasions come  
224 in like - I done seen him - one of the gay dudes that was in our dorm, he  
225 roughed him up and told him to come in and apologize to our dorm, and then  
226 told him to slap himself. Like - like, "Go ahead and do what I told you to do,"  
227 and he slapped himself and said, "I apologize to the dorm."  
228  
229 Q: Did (Tyree) ever interact with that guy?  
230  
231 A: No. That's what I mean, (Tyree) didn't interact with no cops. He was a please-  
232 and-thank-you cop - I mean he was a please-and-thank-you  
233  
234 Q: Do you get pill call?  
235  
236 A: Yeah.  
237  
238 Q: All right. Did you get pill call last night?  
239  
240 A: Yeah.  
241  
242 Q: You're in 13. I understand that they're doing pill call up by the front door now,  
243 right?  
244  
245 A: Yeah.  
246  
247 Q: You can't really see what's going on from 13, can you?  
248  
249 A: No.  
250  
251 Q: Did you see any problems with (Tyree) during pill call last night?  
252

253 A: Yes. I wa- I, uh...  
254  
255 Q: What happened?  
256  
257 A: He tried to cheek his meds. He doesn't like taking him. He said that made him  
258 tired.  
259  
260 Q: Mm-hm.  
261  
262 A: But then, after that, he, uh, he kind of like - kind of blew up, like, "Hey, y'all  
263 keepin' me here. I got three release dates. You said I got to take these pills to  
264 get out." And then he grabbed his pills, and he swallowed 'em, and said, "Ah,"  
265 and walked back to his room and slammed his door.  
266  
267 Q: Just the pills from last night?  
268  
269 A: Yeah.  
270  
271 Q: All right. Was it a li- just a cup?  
272  
273 A: Yeah.  
274  
275 Q: Um, and where did that happen?  
276  
277 A: Happened right in between the dorm, um, right between pill call and walking  
278 past the, uh, desk to g- yeah.  
279  
280 Q: Okay. Uh, did you hear him yelling anything at the nurse? Did he call her any  
281 names?  
282  
283 A: No.  
284  
285 Q: (Unintelligible)?  
286  
287 A: Yeah, that's what I mean, he's - he's n- he's not - that's not the type of he  
288 is.  
289  
290 Q: Was that behavior -- not the cheeking behavior, but the behavior of, you  
291 know, slamming his pills, "Aah," you know, (unintelligible) -- was that  
292 normal for him? Because it sounds to me like he was kind of a quiet dude,  
293 kept to himself?  
294

295 A: Not really normal, but if you, like - like, if you pick at him, he would blow up.  
296 You get what I mean? He - but, like - like - how can I explain? Like, you can  
297 joke with him. Like, I joke - like, like we all joke with him, and he would  
298 know, "Ha ha ha. They're they're laughing with me, not at me." But he can  
299 tell, like, whe- when you're just like mm, mm, mm. Like, he never blew up on  
300 us inmates, he never blew up on - we got - like, we got a lot of cops in there  
301 that we respect. Like, I'm not a cop basher, you know what I mean? Like, like  
302 we got our cops (unintelligible), we got cops in there we all respect. He never  
303 blew up on these cops because they treat us as human beings. (Lubrum), on  
304 the other hand, doesn't treat us or respect us as human beings. He just - like I  
305 said, he...  
306

307 MAN: What kind of form do you have?  
308

309 Q: So, you're having problems with (Lubrum)?  
310

311 A: (Lubrum), yeah.  
312

313 Q: Uh, after pill call, you guys eventually had laundry?  
314

315 A: We did laundry and program.  
316

317 Q: Laundry and program, okay.  
318

319 A: After laundry program they did cell searches.  
320

321 Q: During laundry and program, had no problems?  
322

323 A: No problem whatsoever...  
324

325 Q: No - no problems with canteen, nothing?  
326

327 A: None whatsoever. He was quiet. Like I said, he - he'll walk around the dorm,  
328 dig through the trash, and I gave him my tray for the night, like, "Here, you  
329 want to tray?" Gave him the tray. He stopped gettin' out - I said, "Get out the  
330 trash," gave him a little coffee, that was it. Stayed out for an hour, locked it  
331 down. They went upstairs, messed with another His name is (Zu)-...  
332

333 Q: This was during the search?  
334

335 A: Yep.  
336



337 Q: Okay?  
338  
339 A: And his name is, uh, I want to say. Slapped him up -- he came out  
340 today talking about it -- he slapped him up, he was screaming, begging for  
341 help. Left him alone, closed the door. They did their searches, came  
342 downstairs, did our searches. They got t- they went to his cell first. You hear  
343 him crying and screaming and begging, "Please, stop. Please. I'm sorry."  
344  
345 Q: What was he saying?  
346  
347 A: He said, "I'm sorry. Whatever I did, please just stop. Please, please." And you  
348 just hearing, like - like, tears in his voice, c- I'm st- "I'm sorry. I'm sorry."  
349  
350 Q: You said he was begging?  
351  
352 A: Yeah, like, "Please, just stop. Please."  
353  
354 Q: Were they saying anything to him?  
355  
356 A: No.  
357  
358 Q: You didn't hear them say stand up? You didn't hear them say...  
359  
360 A: (Unintelligible) stand up...  
361  
362 Q: ...get down? Lay down?  
363  
364 A: ...I didn't hear get down. I didn't hear stop resisting...  
365  
366 Q: Get on the wall?  
367  
368 A: I didn't hear nothing. I just heard him screaming and begging. And I - I've  
369 been in this jail a - a while, so I - I know all the little - they didn't say nothing,  
370 nothing.  
371  
372 Q: Were you watching?  
373  
374 A: I can't see from there, but I put my ear to the - my, uh...  
375  
376 Q: So, you could hear but you...  
377  
378 A: Yeah.

379  
380 Q: ...couldn't see?  
381  
382 A: Yeah.  
383  
384 Q: Okay.  
385  
386 A: Like, I can - I - I can catch a gli- I can see his cell, per se, but I can't see inside  
387 of his cell. Like, from certain angles, like, if I'm 48, 47, I'll be able to see, or  
388 the cell next to him is 41, I want to say.  
389  
390 Q: Mm-hm.  
391  
392 A: I'll be able to see. I was at a angle where I could see his door but not inside of  
393 his cell.  
394  
395 Q: M'kay.  
396  
397 A: And...  
398  
399 Q: How long did that go on?  
400  
401 A: I'll say at least 4 to 5 minutes.  
402  
403 Q: Okay. And so, then what happened?  
404  
405 A: Okay, he got...  
406  
407 Q: They left, right?  
408  
409 A: ...he got - yeah, they - they left, but they turned off his light and shut his door.  
410  
411 Q: Was that normal?  
412  
413 A: No, it's not normal at all. Because I remember, I was kind of like - like, man, I  
414 said something to him (unintelligible) always fuckin' turnin' our lights  
415 (unintelligible). Turn my lights off. 'Cause I don't like the light, so I turned my  
416 lights off, and then when I s- when they turned his lights off, it was kind of,  
417 like, creepy-like.  
418  
419 Q: So, they left 39, and they went 37, and they went on down, right?  
420

421 A: Yeah.  
422  
423 Q: And then they eventually came to your cell, right?  
424  
425 A: Yeah.  
426  
427 Q: You said you didn't have any extras?  
428  
429 A: No.  
430  
431 Q: But - I'm sorry, did you say that?  
432  
433 A: No, I didn't say that...  
434  
435 Q: Oh, I'm sorry...  
436  
437 A: I didn't have...  
438  
439 Q: ...it must have been the guy before you.  
440  
441 A: Yeah.  
442  
443 Q: Uh, so they were looking for extras. You didn't have any?  
444  
445 A: None. I had a extra mattress.  
446  
447 Q: Oh, that must have been the one that was out on the floor when we were  
448 there...  
449  
450 A: Yeah.  
451  
452 Q: Okay. So, did they go all three into your cell or did they kind of just stay at the  
453 door?  
454  
455 A: They all came in.  
456  
457 Q: Was your light on or off?  
458  
459 A: One light was - my big bright light was on, my little light was off. They shut  
460 my little light on.  
461  
462 Q: They turned it on?

463  
464 A: Yeah.  
465  
466 Q: Did they search your stuff or did they just look?  
467  
468 A: They searched my cell, they opened my pants up, they went under my - 'cause  
469 I'm on - I'm on (unintelligible) for my do-rag for my hair, so they was looking  
470 for that.  
471  
472 Q: Okay.  
473  
474 A: But they didn't find it.  
475  
476 Q: They just found the mattress?  
477  
478 A: They found - I gave 'em my extra mattress, 'cause I - I know how these cops  
479 (unintelligible) how, like, certain inmates are when we know we gettin'  
480 searched, if we been here for a while, we throw all our extras that they will  
481 find eventually in front of our doors, like the room's...  
482  
483 Q: Right.  
484  
485 A: ...only so big...  
486  
487 Q: Right.  
488  
489 A: ...you're gonna find it.  
490  
491 Q: Right.  
492  
493 A: So that's what all of us - so, I had my mattress right there. I said, "That's all I  
494 got." Said, "Well, I'm about to search anyway, because you got - you like to  
495 wear that beanie."  
496  
497 Q: When they left - uh, so they probably were in there for a minute or two, right?  
498  
499 A: Yeah.  
500  
501 Q: When they left, they shut your light off?  
502  
503 A: No, they did not...  
504

505 Q: They left it on?  
506  
507 A: They left everybody's light on except m- except his.  
508  
509 Q: Except (Tyree)'s?  
510  
511 A: Yes.  
512  
513 Q: Um, and then they finished?  
514  
515 A: They finished, collected all the clothes.  
516  
517 Q: (Unintelligible)?  
518  
519 A: Put everything in the back, walked out. They weren't gone no longer than - I  
520 would say he w- he did count 15, 20 minutes later.  
521  
522 Q: While they were gone, normally - normally, can you hear (Tyree) over there?  
523  
524 A: He's a quiet cat. He - he don't - he's not...  
525  
526 Q: You don't hear nothing?  
527  
528 A: Nope.  
529  
530 Q: But while they were gone, did you hear anything coming from his area?  
531  
532 A: No. I - I heard, like - like, a boom, but I don't know if that was him or not. I  
533 heard a little boom, but that was about it.  
534  
535 Q: And it was maybe probably just from...  
536  
537 A: Yeah.  
538  
539 Q: ...the area over there...  
540  
541 A: Yeah, it could have been - it could have been anybody. The...  
542  
543 Q: Could have been anybody?  
544  
545 A: ...the dorm echoes when it get quiet.  
546

547 Q: Yeah, it does. So, eventually, though, they came back.  
548  
549 A: Yeah.  
550  
551 Q: Then what happened?  
552  
553 A: One cop, (Lubrum) came back, he did count. I remember I was reading a book  
554 and he walked by. He banged on (Tyree) door, boom. He said, "You fuckin'  
555 stink." Because he shit and he was dead, you know what I mean? Said, "You  
556 fuckin' stink," hit his door, kept walkin'. Went upstairs, came back down, and  
557 then started yelling his name, "(Tyree), get up. (Tyree). (Tyree)." Then he ran  
558 out and he went to go get the other cops. Then the other two ran in, they  
559 opened the thing, they drug him out, and start working on him. And they  
560 called it in. That's when everybody ran in.  
561  
562 Q: What do you think happened to (Tyree)?  
563  
564 A: Honestly...  
565  
566 Q: Yeah.  
567  
568 A: I think they killed him.  
569  
570 Q: Why do you think that?  
571  
572 A: Off of the simple fact of how it went down. Okay...  
573  
574 Q: Because, I mean, you couldn't see anything.  
575  
576 A: I can't - I can't see. That's what - it's my opinion.  
577  
578 Q: Right.  
579  
580 A: I believe they killed him just off on how he - how he interacts. Because...  
581  
582 Q: Mm-hm.  
583  
584 A: ...you know what I mean, like - like he been there the whole time, he ne- he  
585 never went on suicide watch. He never had any, like - like...  
586  
587 Q: But he's cheeking?  
588

589 A: He did that once.  
590  
591 Q: Mm-hm?  
592  
593 A: That's the only time he ever got caught for it, I should say. But, like, yeah, but  
594 he - but you don't understand, he - because you got some people that cheeks...  
595  
596 Q: Mm-hm?  
597  
598 A: ...because they like, "I don't like how these pills make me feel." Like me,  
599 personally, I got caught cheeking before. It's not because I want to harm  
600 myself, not because I want to sell my pills.  
601  
602 Q: You just don't want to take 'em?  
603  
604 A: It's because, yeah, I don't like how the way they make me feel. But then you  
605 got these psychiatrists, like, if you don't take them, they're going to tell the  
606 court. And the court is like, you have to take them if you want...  
607  
608 Q: Right.  
609  
610 A: And he, for one, had to take 'em if he wanted to go home.  
611  
612 Q: Mm-hm.  
613  
614 A: So, he might cheek 'em if he can sneak them out like you don't got 'em, throw  
615 'em in the trash and keep walking, "Took my pills." If you get caught, then  
616 that's when you - they make you take 'em. You gotta go, "Aah. I took 'em."  
617  
618 Q: You had mentioned earlier that he didn't take his pill because it made him feel  
619 tired.  
620  
621 A: Yeah.  
622  
623 Q: Well, how'd you hear that?  
624  
625 A: He talks to us.  
626  
627 Q: He'd tell y- he would - he would say that? Um, and you heard - from what you  
628 heard - now, you can tell the difference betwee- you can tell the - could you  
629 see - can you see cell?  
630

631 A: No, I can't.  
632  
633 Q: So, y- from what happens at and what happens in (Tyree)'s cell, is you  
634 can just hear what's going on? Can you...  
635  
636 A: You can hear the screaming.  
637  
638 Q: Can you tell the difference between what's going on at cell and what's  
639 going on at (Tyree)'s cell?  
640  
641 A: Yes, you can.  
642  
643 Q: By the sound?  
644  
645 A: By the sound and by I can see (Tyree) door. Because at first when they - they  
646 hemmed up yelled. And that's when (Ferris) ran in. At first, it was  
647 only two cops. It was (Rodriguez) and it was, uh, it...  
648  
649 Q: (Unintelligible)...  
650  
651 A: ...was (Lubrum). They did this whole thing. Mm. They got to cell.  
652 he's one of the - he's one of them pissed off  
653  
654 Q: Mm-hm.  
655  
656 A: ...all the time. He mad at you for no reason. Okay, he was mad - or he was  
657 already mad because he likes to borrow shots of coffee from people, and they  
658 sell 'em like, "Hey, I give you this shot, I want your envelopes." He would end  
659 up bo- borrowing so many shots of coffee, he'd only get two envelopes a  
660 week. So, then it's like everybody's mad at him, so he'll just make a big scene  
661 so now the cops will pay attention, nobody hits So, he's already pissed  
662 off.  
663  
664 MAN: (Unintelligible)...  
665  
666 A: And (Lubrum), because -- I forget which inmate it was, they said something to  
667 like, "Hey man, I'm losing my patience with you buying my fucking  
668 stamped envelopes." said, "Threaten me again, and I get this whole  
669 dorm locked down. Fuck you." And start walking towards the stairs. Like,  
670 "I'm about to lock it down so you don't try to beat me up." (Lubrum)  
671 specifically said, "No, don't lock it down, let them get you." That's -  
672 that's the - that's...



673

674 Q: When was that?

675

676 A: That was at pro- program. He said, "Nah, don't lock it down."

677

678 Q: Oh, yesterday?

679

680 A: Yeah. And we all kinda joked about it, 'cause, like, (unintelligible) the last one  
681 that hemmed up (Tyree), 'cause it be kind of funny when they hem people up,  
682 you know what I mean? Like, well it's not funny to normal people, but we get  
683 our laughs any way, we can. But, you know what I mean, so when they - we  
684 all laugh, "Ha ha, he - they trying to fuck up ." (Unintelligible)  
685 somebody to fuck up . Because that's the type of cop (Lubrum) is. Like,  
686 if you ever check his, like, little past history of - well, just this month, him  
687 being in there, we done had at least two to three fights, and he say the same  
688 thing every time, "I don't see nothing. I didn't see nothing." And on his  
689 reports, "I heard it but I didn't see it," or "I didn't hear or see nothing." But you  
690 got - you got - constantly got inmates rolling it up out of our dorm, constantly  
691 got inmates with a black eye. And now he gotta lock our dorm down and bring  
692 in cops. And when they asked, 'Hey, what happened?' "I didn't see it. I was  
693 watching this side, and it just happened so fast."

694

695 MAN: (Unintelligible).

696

697 A: But he know who the inmates are that are beatin' up people. It's a gang called  
698 (Northern Riders). He know all of them are. But, that's what I mean with  
699 (Lubrum), if he see that you s- got a little bit of saneness about you, and  
700 you're s- if you got somebody to call...

701

702 MAN: (Unintelligible)...

703

704 A: ...he - he won't mess with you. If he see, like, you're one of the inmates that's,  
705 like - like - like - like, short-tempered and, like, "Dude I'm looking at all day  
706 already," like, "Leave me the fuck alone, I'll leave you alone," he won't mess  
707 with you. I th- me and (Lubrum) had words one time, and I told him like,  
708 "Man, look, I'm looking at 60 years, I'm on a Fed case. Hey dude, I respect,"  
709 I'm like, "It's your house, I know that. Leave me the fuck alone, though."

710

711 Q: Just do your time.

712

713 A: Yeah, I'm like, "I'm here to do my time. I'm not gonna buck your system. I'm  
714 not gonna buck your authority. I'm gonna do whatever program you want to

715 do. I don't like jail, but I gotta respect it. Leave me alone, though." And ever  
716 since then he kind of left me alone. But if he see that you're a they can't  
717 defend yourself through word, he's gonna fuck with - he's gonna push you.

718  
719 Q: So, from the past that you've seen from (Luven) - (Lubrum) and (Rodriguez)  
720 and - and we'll call him (Flores)...

721  
722 MAN: (Unintelligible).

723  
724 MAN2: (Unintelligible).

725  
726 Q: ...and what you heard coming from over by (Tyree)'s cell last night, you think  
727 they did something to him?

728  
729 A: Yes.

730  
731 Q: Um, when they brought (Tyree) out of s- out of the cell, and they laid him  
732 down, could you see him then?

733  
734 MAN: (Unintelligible)...

735  
736 A: No, the pillar blocked everything.

737  
738 Q: Pillar blocked everything?

739  
740 A: I could see the hand movements (unintelligible) on his chest. I took CPR  
741 class, so I know the hand movements and everything.

742  
743 Q: How was their demeanor afterwards?

744  
745 MAN: (Unintelligible)...

746  
747 MAN2: (Unintelligible)...

748  
749 A: Honestly, I seen Lu- I didn't see (Flores) or (Rodriguez) come (unintelligible)  
750 that dorm not one time...

751  
752 MAN: (Unintelligible)...

753  
754 A: ...that's when - I seen 'em come in, when they sayin' that he's dead and all  
755 those other cops rushed in. They walked out, didn't see 'em again. I seen

756 (Lubrum) afterwards. He had a look of defeat on his face. Looking was like -  
757 not a look of, "Oh, I found a dead body." No, a look of...  
758  
759 MAN: (Unintelligible)...  
760  
761 A: ..."What did I do?"  
762  
763 MAN2: Yeah.  
764  
765 A: Because, like, I can honestly say this -- and I believe it's a fact -- even if they  
766 didn't...  
767  
768 MAN2: (Unintelligible)...  
769  
770 A: ...bump his head or something to make him die, even if it is suicide, they  
771 pushed him to that. You got some like them - the people that goes and  
772 shoot up all these schools and that blows up stuff, it's because they potentially  
773 got bullied into doing that. And I just read it in the paper, them kids that raped  
774 that little girl, she killed herself at school. They pushed her into doing that. It's  
775 - only - people can only take so much. You got some strong-minded people,  
776 you got some weak-minded people, and he was one of them. That's why  
777 inmates in here don't go around bullying and beating up 'cause when  
778 stuff like this happens, we're the bad guys.  
779

782 Q: Can you name and tell me about a specific incident that maybe (Lubrum) had  
783 problems with (Tyree)? And I mean like they got into it, but more like, you  
784 know, a...  
785  
786 A: Just a - a gesture? Like, look at him?  
787  
788 Q: Yeah.  
789  
790 A: In a trash can. He - he - this is (Lubrum), he won't say words, but he'll give  
791 you the - a look at him...  
792  
793 Q: Right. Make everybody look at him...  
794  
795 A: (Unintelligible). Yes, now we're all looking, like - and then, like - like, if  
796 you're a bully, you'll laugh, and that's what make (Lubrum) like you. But if  
797 you one of them people like, "Hey, man take a tray, man. You hungry?"

798 "Yeah, yeah. Please." Huh. They'll - they'll be like, "Jokes on you, (Lubrum),  
799 we're not laughing at this dude.  
800  
801 MAN: (Unintelligible)...  
802  
803 Q: Like a bully?  
804  
805 A: Yeah, he's a - he - I don't know how many people you've talked to, but I'm  
806 pretty sure they all said bully. He's...  
807  
808 MAN2: Yeah.  
809  
810 A: ...a bully. We all see it. W- we all see it in him.  
811  
812 MAN2: My (Unintelligible)...  
813  
814 Q: How - how old are you?  
815  
816 A:  
817  
818 Q: When's the first time you went to jail?  
819  
820 A: Juvenile Hall, I'd say 13.  
821  
822 Q: So, in eight years you've been, you know, seen a lot of COs, seen a lot of POs,  
823 a lot of people guarding you. Uh...  
824  
825 A: I...  
826  
827 Q: ...is - is how (Lubrum) act- is it normal?  
828  
829 A: No, it's not. Honestly, because, like, is my federal name. I'm - my  
830 real name is . I'm here on a federal hold because I'm from San  
831 Jo-...
