22		last Wednesday, the 26th, did you work that day?

36	A:	It's from, uh, 1800 hours to 0600 hours.

38	Q:	Okay. And do you have a normal assignment where you're assigned?

44	A:	It's the Infirmary, Module 2C.

46	Q:	2C, what kind of Unit is that or Module?
47		
48	A:	It's the Medical Floor unit, sir, regular module. We take care of inmates that,
49		uh, have special medical needs. We have two nurses on-scene there, and an
50		officer - an officer position as well.
51		
52	Q:	Excellent. Let me just back up a little bit, how long have you been employed
53		with the Sheriff's Office?
54		
55	A:	Uh, for about nine months with, uh, Correctional Officer, as a - as a
56		Correctional Deputy.
57		
58	Q:	Okay. And have you always been on this team? What team is the C Team or
59		D Team?
60		
61	A:	This is D Team, sir.
62		
63	Q:	D team, okay. So for the nine months have you always been D Team?
64		
65	A:	Uh, no, sir, during our training we start on day shift. So three months of
66		training was on B Team, and after those three months of training you switch
67		over to the opposite team for the night shift.
68		
69	Q:	Okay. And how long have you been at the Infirmary in 2C.
70		
71	A:	Uh, approximately three months, sir.
72		
73	Q:	Three months in 2C, all right. And now moving up to last Wednesday, the
74		26th, uh, you went to your normal assignment?
75 		
76	A:	Yes, sir.

78	Q:	Okay, tell me - tell me how the day went or the shift went. You can just kinda
79		summarize it.
80		
81	A:	Regular shift got - got on-deck at approximately 1800 hours, um, to conduct
82		the normal duties. Wednesday would have been commissary, so we would
83		have done pill-all first.

85	Q:	What time does pill call normally
86		
87	A:	Uh, normally, after pill count clears, um, generally, approximately, 1900
88		hours.
89	_	
90	Q:	Okay, so an hour after you start?
91		
92	A:	About, sir.
93	_	
94	Q:	Okay.
95		
96	A:	It's, generally whenever count clears, whenever North Control lets us know.
97		
98	Q:	Oh I see. And is your pill call a little different from other floors? Does - does
99		the nurse actually go inside your unit?
100		
101	A:	Uh, the nurses are on-deck already, so they're in the Unit.
102		
103	Q:	Oh okay.
104		
105	A:	And they have an office in - in the module as well, so it does conduct a little
106		bit different. Nurses are always on-scene.
107		
108	Q:	Okay. How long does your pill-call normally take? Does it depend
109		
110	A:	Uh, it varies, sir. I'd, generally, say between an hour and a half to two hours.

112	Q:	Wow, okay, so one and a half to two hours. And on Wednesday, the 26th,
113		did, uh, pill-call - did anything happen on pill-call, anything unusual?
114		
115	A:	Uh, not that I recall, sir, nothing unusual.

118		
119	A:	Uh, after pill-call, would have conducted commissary, and after commissary I
120		would have opened up for program.

122	Q:	And if you can remember, is that - is that what happened?

124	A:	I'd have to check my logbook to be sure, sir, but, uh, I believe that's what
125		occurred on Wednesday.

129	A:	And then program, yes, sir.

131	Q:	And to the best of your recollection, did anything happen in your deck, in 2C,
132		that would be significant.

136	Q:	Okay. And do you - if you can remember, do you remember what time
137		program time ended?
138		
139	A:	We always run late on programs, so program would have ended at 2300 hours.

141	Q:	Oh okay. Um, did you get lunch relief?
142		
143	A:	Yes, sir.
144		
145	Q:	Do you remember what time you went to lunch?
146		·
147	A:	Camera will note the exact time, sir, but I believe it was sometime after
148		midnight.
149		
150	Q:	Okay. So we're goin' forward and backwards. I'll back up a little bit. Did you
151		have a break in there? Some
152		
153	A:	Uh, j no sir, I only get relief for lunch break.
154		
155	Q:	Okay. So you got relieved after midnight?
156		
157	A:	Yes sir.
158		
159	Q:	And then did something happen while you were on lunch relief? Who, I'm
160		sorry, who relieved you? Do you remember the officer?
161		
162	A:	I can't recall the officer right now, sir.
163		
164	Q:	Okay. Did something happen in the facility when you were on lunch break?
165		
166	A:	As soon as I went on lunch break, uh, I heard over the radio - I can't remember
167		the Unit that called for it, but they called for additional Deputies on the 6th
168		floor.

172	A:	Yes, sir.

174	Q:	Do you know if it was a 415, or Medical call, or
