# INTERVIEW WITH SGT. AGUILAR <br> Q=Sgt. Carrasco <br> A=Sgt. Aguilar 

Q: All right, today is December 17, 2015. It's approximately 6:30 in the evening. My name is Sergeant Carrasco badge number 1643. And in the room interview room with me is Sergeant Aguilar - Custody Sergeant Aguilar. We're gonna be discussing case, uh, 15-239-0032 and it's just gonna be a follow-up interview regarding the next shift after the, uh, the death incident. Um, Sergeant Aguilar, you've already written a report already regarding, uh, when you responded to, uh, 6-B, uh, that shift. So I just want to focus on after the incident that morning when everybody left. You get off at six o'clock in the morning or...

Uh, 4:30.
4:30 in the morning? Okay.
Mm-hm.
And then when you came back to shift, it was what time?
1630.

1630? And that would have been on August 27, 2015?
Uh, it - that would have been the same date I got off and got on. It would have been the same day.

27th? Okay.
That's probably - yeah.
All right, 1630 hours. And when you came on to shift that, uh, afternoon, um, did you have a pass down from the day shift?

Q:

The pass down I had was for my areas that I worked. So it would have been two, four, and south. Uh, I don't remember anything being significant about that pass down. It was just more or less standard passed down.

Mm-hm. Uh, out of Main Jail South?
Yeah, Main Jail South, uh, second floor, fourth floor, and south. Those were my areas that week.

Okay, you weren't in charge of doing the schedule?
No, at the time, uh, there was three sergeants working that week. Uh, so, uh, Sergeant (Duran), uh, was in charge of the schedule and was in charge of the basement as well.

Mm-hm. And, uh, Sergeant (Brackett)?
(Brackett) was in charge of floors five through eight.
Main Jail North?
Main Jail North, yes.
And then you were what, two, four, and Main Jail South?
Two, four, and south, correct.
Okay, um, during the beginning of your shift, did you have any contact with either, uh, Lubrin, Farris, or Rodriguez?

No, I - I didn't.
Okay, do you know - I know it's been a few months now. Do you know where they were assigned that, uh, that shift?

I'm not - I'm not sure where they were assigned. Um, I couldn't tell you without looking at the schedule. I have an idea.

Mm-hm. Okay, um, at some point during the shift, uh, you were contacted either by Lieutenant (Meyers) or was it Sergeant (Brackett) about the impending, uh, officers being placed on admin leave?

| A: | Uh, it was (Brackett) who advised us. He was advised by Lieutenant <br> (Meyers). |

| Q: | And about - know about what time that was? |
| A: | No, it must have been - well I don't know exactly. Uh, I can't recall. I'm - I'm <br> thinking maybe it's closer - it wasn't at the beginning of the shift. I think it was <br> closer to maybe like 11 o'clock or something like that. |
| Q: | Okay, and what did, uh, where - where were you at at the time that Sergeant <br> (Brackett) advised or gave this information to you? |
| A: | I think Sergeant (Duran) and I were both in the first floor sergeants' office. |
| Q: | Okay, um, and what did he say? |
| A: | I think he just advised us that, uh, that those three were gonna be walked off. |
| Q: | Okay. |

And he specified, you know, Farris, Lubrin, and Rodriguez and, uh, that he was gonna have to walk them off. And I think there was a discussion between all of us thinking, "Hey, that's - that's, uh, it's, uh, how are you gonna manage that? What if they have lockers at north and south?"

Mm-hm.
And, uh, you know. it wouldn't be wise to walk one off and then come back, walk the next one off, walk the next one off. So we, uh, we thought maybe it'd be better the three of us go and walk them all off at one time.

Okay, were they supposed to go somewhere first to get some sort of paperwork or how was that gonna work?

They were supposed to come from wherever they were working. They were supposed to leave their keys and their radios there...

Mm-hm.
...and report to the admin conference room across from the lieutenants' office.

Q: Okay, did somebody make that phone call or do you remember how that was...

A: How - how it happened? I - I'm not sure, but I believe Sergeant (Brackett) had notified them. And, uh, I want to say they were retrieved where we went up to the decks and then asked them to leave the radios and keys and come right down. Um, if I remember correctly, I want to say it was maybe Farris and Rodriguez that were brought down.

Mm-hm.
Um, Farris was advised and was standing by the floor station. And I think Rodriguez walked out of the unit and right into it and just said, "Hey, leave your keys and radios here. Get your personal belongings. Come with us." And that was it and then brought them down to the conference room.

Did they ask any questions as to where they were going with you or they were just kind of like, "Okay."?

No, I think it - just the fact that, uh, Sergeant (Brackett) and I being there and just giving them the - the directives to leave that stuff there and come with us, they were more or less just following orders and just wondering what's going on.

Okay.
Um, but they - they didn't ask anything while they were on the deck or while we walked with them. And then, uh, I think (Brackett) may have told them, "Okay, you guys come with us. We need to - we need to talk to the lieutenant right now."

Okay.
He was bringing them down.
And, uh, the lieutenant that night was Lieutenant (Meyers)?
Yes.
And was he in his office or was he in the conference room?

A: I think he was in the office. Uh, well I want to say Lubrin was already there in the conference room...

...and by himself and, uh, lieutenant was in his office. And then the other two were brought down and went into the office - into that conference room. And (Meyers) was, uh, printing out some letters. I guess there was some letters that he was, uh, gonna give them. And then he walked into the conference room with all three of them and - and the door was shut. Uh, Sergeant (Brackett), myself, and Sergeant (Duran), we waited outside by, uh, like. a copy machine area or by lieutenants' office right there just waiting for him to finish talking to them.

Okay, so he addressed them all at the same time?
Yes.
How long did that meeting last? Do you know?
Mm , not very long, a few minutes maybe. Uh, less than five minutes.
Now were you given instructions as to what was gonna happen when they came out?

Yeah. Because before (Meyers) went in to - to talk to them, uh, we told him we would be waiting there...

Mm-hm.
...that we were gonna help walk them out because we didn't feel it was right, you know, just (Brackett) doing it by himself and whatnot. And he just - we just waited there and, uh, when (Meyers) walked out, um, you know, eveverybody walked out after him.

Mm-hm.
And I just said, "Okay, guys, just remember," I think (Meyers) may have said something on, uh - uh, that we would be walking them out at this time. And, uh, just like, you know, normal closing of salutations or something like, "Okay.

Mm-hm.
Take care," and whatnot. And then we walked them to - to their lockers. We asked him where their lockers were at and they said they were all at south.

How - in your opinion, how was their demeanor as...
After they walked out of the conference room, they were, uh, more or less quiet, uh, kind of withdrawn, somber. Like, uh, maybe unsure the circumstances where they were...

Mm-hm.
...taking it in perhaps. Um, uh, I don't know the best - the best thing, uh, you know, that I could think of is maybe just, you know, just like a - like surreal moment. They just - they can't believe it's happening or something like that...

Mm-hm.
...and just walked out. They didn't - they didn't seem disturbed by it. They just seemed like rather just kind of shocked.

Okay.
Mm-hm.
And so all three of you, all three sergeants and then all three, uh, officers then walked to Main Jail South where their lockers were?

Correct.
Okay.
Mm-hm.
And did - did they ask any questions during that time period?
No, it was kind of a, uh, I think it was an awkward moment for them because they're walking through the facility.

Mm-hm.

Um, everybody's watching them. They're watching us. It's not a common sight to see. So I think they were just kind of, um, taken by it. We were, too. We weren't tryin' to spark any conversations or anything...

Sure.
...or make light of anything. So we just...
Mm-hm.
...kept it, uh, kept it serious I guess.
And what happened when you got into the locker room at Main Jail South?
Uh, when we walked into the locker room to the right - as you first walk into the locker room, there's lockers that are on the left and right...

Mm-hm.
...and there's some towards further back. Farris and, uh, Farris and Rodriguez when they walked in, they walked towards the right. Uh, (Brackett) and (Duran) who were in front of me followed them and walked towards their lockers. They had the lockers on the same row. Lubrin was walking about, you know, straight still as if...

Mm-hm.
...you know, his locker was further back. So I just followed Lubrin because (Brackett) and (Duran) were already with Farris and Rodriguez.

Okay, could you still see the other two or the other four?
No, the moment, uh, the moment I passed the row where they walked down, I couldn't see them any longer because, uh, Lubrin had a locker that was two rows back.

So if they were talking or anything you wouldn't be able to hear them or...

No, I wouldn't be able to hear it or - hear or see, uh, unless it was loud...
...or loud enough...
...for me to hear but I didn't hear conversations, uh, at all.
Do you know if anybody else was in the locker or do - did you think it was empty?

Uh, I didn't see anybody else in the locker. Uh, we thought it was empty. Um, I thought it was empty anyways. And, um, when we got there to, uh, to the locker room, I don't recall seeing anybody walking or in the weight room or anything like that because of the hour. It wasn't - it was time...

Mm-hm.
More - more people would be at their site...
...place, not the locker room.
So Lubrin goes to his locker. You follow him?

Uh, was it a lock locker for - with, like, a key or was it like a combination where you have to twist the numbers? Do you remember?

Uh, the type of lock?

A: Uh, that I don't - I don't remember which type of lock, whether it was a combo or, um, a key.

Mm-hm.
I'm thinking it might have been a combo because I don't remember seeing him pull a key out.

Okay.
But I'm not sure. I just kind of remember where his locker was.
And, uh, did he say anything as he was opening his locker or did he ask any questions before we opened his locker or...

No, he didn't ask any questions or anything. We just told him, hey, we need him to collect his bunk. I think all that was already said. He kind of knew what was about to happen.

Okay.
So he was just going through the motions. He already - he had opened his locker, opened it up, and I - I gave him a bag. He opened it and I said, "I need to collect the items that, uh, belong to the department."

Q: Mm-hm.
A:
And - and any - and the only conversations that we pretty much carried were confirming things that whether he can keep or not. For example, if it - it was, uh, a specialty cuff case, he says, "Can I keep this?" I said, "Well the department didn't issue that to you. Uh, you bought that on your own. You it's your property. You - you can keep that." Um, and, um, that was basically it I think.

## Do you remember - I mean it's been a while. Do you remember what you

 actually collected?A:
I think I collected - let's see. Yeah - yeah.
Q:
Or that was put in the bag?

A: That was put in the bag? Um, this - I think it was Bell, uh, like, flashlight, the holders...

Mm-hm.
...for the fla- the holder for the flashlight, uh, maybe a cuff ca- cuff case and some cuffs. Um, I don't think - I want to say - I want to say collected his ID but I think the lieutenant might have collected this ID at that time.

Okay, so you're not sure?
Yeah, I'm trying to recall. Um...
Do you remember if he had anything that he had bought specifically that he kept? Like - like you had mentioned right now a specialty item or something that...

Aspecific item? Man, I wish I had known all this. I would've made it - I would've made it really clear, uh, to inventory everything. Um, I don't remember specifically but I know it was something that he probably would have purchased himself. I think it was something that was a duty belt type of, uh, equipment. And then he just asked if you can keep it and I said, "Well that wasn't issued to you." I remember telling him that and, uh, "But it's - it's authorized but you just can't, you know, I just can't take it. We didn't we didn't buy that for you."

Okay, could you see inside of his locker?
From where I was standing, I couldn't see in his locker. It wasn't until he left and I looked over and just made sure it was empty and then...

...then he shut the door and then that was it.
Um, was he wearing a uniform? So did he change or did he...
He had a uniform and I want to say he changed. I think, uh, he did change because I - I remember when we stepped outside, he wasn't in uniform. He changed. He had to have changed right there while...

A: Uh, I remember taking the rounds and wrapping them in a - a paper towel. Uh, there was a paper towel on the bench. I grabbed the paper towel and just balled them up in that and then, uh, put it in his bag that he was taking. Uh, and then his firearm, I did the same, just I put it separate. So...

Okay, did he actually clean out his entire locker or do you know?
Uh, I didn't see anything in there, so I would say yeah. I didn't - I didn't see anything that was, uh...

Mm-hm.
...left behind, not even paper or anything like that. It just looked em- looked empty. So...

Okay.
Mm-hm.

So he took basically all his personal belongings or...
Yeah, I think he took everything that he had in there with him.
Did he have any extra uniforms in there? Do you know or...
Extra uniforms? No, I didn't see any extra uniforms.
Okay.
He just had the uniform he had on and when he took it off he, like, uh, just, like, balled it up and just put it - just, like, you know, 'cause it's a TDU type.

And - and he just put in the bag with the rest of the stuff and just - just kind of just cleared out - cleared out his locker.

Okay, so he didn't have a lot of stuff in his locker? Everything fit in one bag or...

It didn't seem it was too big. I think the things that took the most room were his boots...

...and his uniform.
Okay.
And - 'cause the rest of the stuff was just superficial stuff. He was wearing his clothes. So...

Yeah, what happened after that?
And then after that he was about done. Farris and Rodriguez along with Sergeant (Brackett) and Sergeant (Duran) come from around the corner.

Mm-hm.
And we're all in the general area where Lubrin's locker is. Um, Lubrin is collecting the final items right there and, uh, he stands there with his stuff. And as Farris and Rodriguez come around the corner, uh, that's where some conversation is - is occurring where it's along the lines of, "Hey, uh, just have faith in the process." And I think (Brackett) was talking to them about that. Farris felt inclined to ask me for my phone number.

Mm-hm.
(Brackett) was right there, too. And he said, "Can I ask Sergeant Aguilar for his phone number?" And he said, "Yeah, that's fine." So he gives me his phone. He asked me to put my phone number in there. It's my personal number. I didn't feel comfortable with it, but this was an awkward moment because he just handed it to me. I could see that these guys are confused and stuff. But since it was my personal number...

Mm-hm.
...I didn't feel comfortable giving it to him. So I gave him an actual number that was off by a digit.

I mean, some people will but - and there are deputies and other sergeants that have my personal number, but it's typically because I socialize with them, uh, outside the work like golf or whatnot. And Farris, I never asso- associated with him outside of work and I thought of all times right now he's gonna ask for it, but I didn't know enough specifics about the circumstance to feel

...and I would feel awkward if they asked me for my number. "Hey, can I get your number?" Uh...

Why?
Yeah, why now?
Yeah.
And it felt weird, so I just didn't feel comfortable with it. If it were - honestly if it were a duty phone - if it was a phone that was assigned to me workrelated, it's the phone I'm supposed to keep...

Mm-hm.
...and I'm like, "Here's my card," or - or whatever...
Sure.
...they would already have it. They - it's, they're entitled to it.
Mm-hm.

A: But my personal phone just felt awkward. I just didn't feel comfortable there. You know, (Brackett) said it would be okay but, you know, I just, you know, I don't think he has (Brackett)'s number and I just didn't feel comfortable.

Okay, um, what sort of questions were they asking?
A
Um, uh, just general like, "Hey, so - so what happens now? What - what's going on? Are, uh, as - are we gonna be contacted or what? What's the process?"

Mm-hm.

And (Brackett) kind of explained to them, "Hey, the process is that you're, uh, you're gonna be on leave. Uh, an investigation is - is happening." Uh, kind of reassured them that, "Hey, just cooperate with the - with the investigation. Be truthful. "

Q: Mm-hm.

A: Um, and, uh, if they needed any services, he offered, uh, the employee counseling services were available for them. If they needed to reach us give us a call here at work. If they had any questions or anything, anything needs to that they can't find, maybe they need a contact with employee services that can't get through...

A: ...that they could contact us or whatever the case may be. And, uh, that was pretty much it. Uh, after that it was more or less, uh, um, it seemed as though they - they couldn't believe it was actually happening. Like, uh, they were kind of shocked.

A: You know, they - no, I don't think so. I think when they were there it seemed that's that out of body feeling or experience that they were going through was - was in the locker room, but the moment we got up to the top of the staircase and we walked out of the facility...
...just on the outside of the building were talking to them about, uh, you know just trying to - trying to stay focused. What we're trying to do is reassure them in our own ways, you know, just to stay calm, stay focused. Uh, this is an investigation. It doesn't mean it's the end. It's just part of the process.

We were trying to, uh, reassure them because, uh, we understood the magnitude of somebody gettin' walked off and we've seen it before. And we didn't want somebody to, you know, not be focused while they're driving and end up in a car accident 'cause they run a red light or something.
Mm-hm.
Mm-hm.
Um, did they all appear like that or was...


## Right.

So we were just trying to talk to them and - and try and give it that time to kinda calm down a little bit, to de-escalate. Farris and - and Rodriguez and Lubrin all had questions in regards to, uh, "Okay, so do we contact an attorney or what happens?" And - and (Brackett) pretty much did the majority of the talking, explained to them the process. But Lubrin made a comment that seemed, like, inconsistent with the circumstance.

Mm-hm.
This is, uh, this is important, right? This is important and it's - it's - it's lifechanging. And, uh, Lubrin makes a comment of, uh, "Could you take a group photo? Is it a group photo time?" or something along that lines. Like, to take a group photo...

Mm-hm.

A: ...because we were all standing right there. And, uh, I thought that was, like, inappropriate and not consistent with...

Yeah.
...the situation.
What was goin' on, yeah.
Yeah, I go, you - you know, in my mind I'm thinking, "You understand this is a - it's a serious matter here in here?" But I know some people have different ways of dealing with stress.

Sure.
And some people, you know, make light of it. We can respond to emergencies and - and people as a way of coping talk themselves through in - in a more animated way...

Sure.
...and others are very, you know, quiet and focused. But that circumstance I just, uh, I don't know. It just didn't reflect very well as far as character.

Mm-hm.
And when I heard it, I was kind of taken by it. And I think (Duran) and I, maybe even, uh, Sergeant (Brackett), we talked about it after like, "Man, can you believe that kind of a comment would come out...

Yeah.
...of somebody at this time?" And - and it was kind of unbelievable for us. But, um, like, and we talked about, you know, people have different ways of coping with things.

Sure.

But it seemed as though Rodriguez and Farris were more or less, uh, you know, I think, uh, Rodriguez was just more or less, uh, concerned and he's just, like, kind of lost, bewildered. And Farris seemed a little bit, um, he's a

real big guy, you know, and - and I - and to see that guy kind of quietly, like, you know, you could see the nervous disposition in him. Like, you know, he doesn't want to lose his job.

He's - he - I think he had a girlfriend who just passed the bar. They were gonna get married. Uh, he wanted to come over to enforcement. So I could see maybe in Farris's mind, all this is going through his mind.

Q: Mm-hm.
A: He's reacting normal... driving home." Go with their families. Uh, contact the union. Contact the attorney for the union. Um, and you know, just to try and focus on the investigation. But we told them, "Be honest. Be forthright. Cooperate with the investigation." And they would be contacted, you know, as part of the process and that - that was pretty much it. And after that they walked off, um, towards their cars. Sergeant (Duran) and (Brack) and I, I think we ended up walking towards - along with them as they walked towards their cars...

Mm-hm.

A: ...and then turned around and came down the ramp back into the facility. So it was - it was not like we turned back and went back in the locker. We walked them all the way to - basically to the curb.

At any time that they make any statement that had anything to do with the incident that happened the night before?

No - no.
Did they ever say anything like, "Yeah, I don't, uh, understand. We didn't do anything," or any - anything to that...

No.
...effect or...

...like, "Why is this happening? Because, you know, I don't understand or..."
I - I would think that maybe Farris or Rodriguez may have asked, but I don't know because I didn't hear or see that. Uh, I think Lubrin - the only thing he may have asked was something along the lines of, um - um, and it's probably the only thing the guy said. Um, well, the one comment he made about taking a picture. And the other guy - and - oh, he said something about his academy. I think they were all in the same academy 'cause he says, um, "Will we still be able to talk to each other? We were in the same academy." And then I go, "You know what? You guys have been able to - been able to talk to each other. I can't tell you not to talk to each other."

Um, maybe around 10 or 11 o'clock, uh, Sergeant (Brackett) informed, uh, you and Sergeant (Duran) -- you were in the first floor sergeants' office -- that a decision has been made that the - the three officers were gonna be placed on admin leave.

Right.
And, uh, collectively you were gonna - you, uh, said that, uh, instead of (Brackett) doing it by himself, you guys were all gonna help out. And, uh, so you're not sure if you went upstairs to get Farris and Rodriguez, but you - you think you probably did.

I think I did. I think I went up there with (Brackett)...
Mm-hm.
...and we just asked him for the radios and keys left in there.
Then they came downstairs to the admin office.
And that was it. Yeah, we walked them down.
And, uh, Lieutenant (Meyers) was in his office printin' out some paperwork.
Mm-hm.
I believe Lubrin was already in the conference room.
Yeah, I believe he was in there already. Mm-hm.
And then, um, the lieutenant took all three officers in there. You guys waited outside and then he had his meeting with them. And then they came out and then you guys escorted them - asked them where their lockers were.

Mm-hm.
They all had their lockers at Main Jail South so you...
Mm-hm.
...basically just kinda walked them through the facility over to the Main Jail South locker room.

And, uh, so do you - do you - and you went with Lubrin but do you know who was st- standing by with, uh, Farris? Was it Sergeant (Brackett)? Was it (Duran)? You're not sure? 'Cause you said you couldn't see him.

Well they walked in the direction - so as, uh, Farris and Rodriguez made the turn into south, uh, there's this little bit of the cement pillar that extends for that row.

So you gotta go around it to go into the row.
I see.
So they go around it to go into the row and then (Brackett) and (Duran) follow along with them as Lubrin and I continue to walk straight.

And then you basically stood by with Lubrin. Uh, as he opened his locker there was a bag there and you were saying that you needed to collect whatever was, uh...
