306 Q2: Yeah, and like he said, we're not here to worry about taking any guns. We're
307 not gonna take any at all.
308
309 A: All right.

311 Q2: It was just for us, safety and you understand that?
312
313 A: Yes. Yeah, yeah.
314
315 Q2: So - and you know what? If no one has told you, thank you for cooperating. In
316 and out and we'll be done. Okay?
317
318 A: So for - for the investigation, right, how - how far am I allowed to know about
319 what's going on? Nothing, right, because I'm involved or whatever?
320
321 Q1: Yeah, I mean as of right now everything is at the early stages of everything.
322 But, you know, considering just, you know what's going on, we - we need to
323 take every precaution imaginable. I mean you're not the only one. Obviously
324 we're - we're over at Farris's house. We're at Rodriguez's house right now. So
325 we're having to collect everything. Unfortunately, we would've just done it
326 that night but because we didn't do it that night, we have to do it this way. So
327 it kind of sucks. But like I said, it's very inconvenient for you. It's an
328 inconvenience for everybody else. But there was so much going on that night.
329 But that's why we're here.
330
331 A: Yeah. Yeah.
332
333 Q2: And I will say the detectives will be more than happy to talk to you but that's
334 gonna be up to you totally.
335
336 A: Sure. I mean...

338 Q2: Yeah.

339

340 A: ...I mean I got nothing to hide.

341

342 Q2: Yeah.

343

344 A: And - and I - when I'm replaying the, ah, the scenario and then I don't know if
345 you guys recorded this or if it's off the record, I mean I don't care, but...

346

347 Q2: And I'm gonna tell you nothing - nothing - don't consider anything to be off
348 the record because you - I mean you're talking to law enforcement.

349

350 A: Okay. Okay, that's - that's fine.

351

352 Q2: And that's gonna be fair to you.

353

354 A: You know how chaotic my dorm is.

355

356 Q1: Oh I know.

357

358 A: Right?

359

360 Q1: Trust me, I know.

361

362 A: I know you know.

363

364 Q1: Mm-hm.

365

366 A: And - and it's like that day I opened up for program too. I opened up for an
367 hour.

368

369 Q2: Mm-hm.

370

371 A: And have you been inside a dorm when you pop 54 of these guys out? Like
372 you just stand there and there's no way for me to manage...

373

374 Q1: Mm-hm.

375

376 A: ...every single one.

377

378 Q1: Right.

379
380 A: That they should give me a second officer if they want better eyes.
381
382 Q1: Mm-hm.
383
384 A: So it's like anything could have happened.
385
386 Q1: Well.
387
388 Q2: Yeah.
389
390 Q1: No I - I - I totally understand and respect that because it's - it's not easy. I don't
391 think I can do what you guys do going in there with 50 something guys.
392
393 A: No, no. You guys...
394
395 Q1: ...in one module.
396
397 A: You guys can. And that's why us - us jail guards look up to you because you
398 guys are dealing with the unknown. I know what I'm dealing with. But the
399 only reason why I know what I'm dealing with is because I'm constantly in
400 their cells and I'm in their shit and that's - that's the only way I can feel safe.
401
402 Q1: Mm-hm.
403
404 A: That's the only reason why I operate the way I do, but it's the - also the reason
405 why I always have all the IRs that I generate.
406
407 Q1: Yeah.
408
409 A: But it's like them - and like of course I - I couldn't put that in my report
410 because it's just like it's a normal thing. So I - I don't know who - who I can
411 explain that to or - or who or what kind of infor- that kind of information
412 would be important to.
413
414 Q1: It doesn't fall on deaf ears.
415
416 Q2: It doesn't.
417
418 Q1: Eve- everybody understands it because there's probably thousands of people
419 that have been in your exact position to know exactly what it's like up there.
420

421 Q2: I did ten years there. I know exactly what you're talking about. I worked in
422 those dorms so I know exactly what you're saying. And he's right. It won't fall
423 on deaf ears. The ones that would want to hear something like that would be
424 like Sergeant (Carasco) who's worked in there as a supervisor and Sergeant
425 (Brown). They would want to hear something like that. But that's up to you.
426 Obviously they can't force you to talk to them.
427

428 A: I mean I'll...

429

430 Q2: So it's gonna be your decision.

431

432 A: Tell them I'll answer any question that anyone wants to know, anything. I can
433 tell you right now.

434

435 Q2: So if I call him right now and say, "Hey he wants - he says he'll answer all
436 your questions," you'll go meet with him right now? Because they're working
437 too right now so.

438

439 A: Sure.

440

441 Q2: Okay.

442

443 A: Yeah.

444

445 Q2: All right.

446

447 A: And - and like - listen to this (unintelligible).

448

449 Q2: It sucks.

450

451 A: Yeah.

452

453 Q2: It does.

454

455 Q1: It's all high liability stuff. Man that's...

456

457 A: I understand.

458

459 Q1: That's where - that's where we're at right now. You know that, we know that.
460 We're in a high liability job and that's why we gotta do what we gotta do.
461

462 A: No, and - and that's why you gotta do your job...

463
464 Q2: Yeah. Absolutely.
465
466 A: ...and it is what it is.
467
468 Q2: And if everything is squared away on your end, right, we owe it to you to
469 clear your name as quickly as possible if that's the case, right? I think - I think
470 you probably heard me say that even. You know, when - when allegations are
471 made against officers, it's important for us to throw everything at it and - and
472 just follow the truth. And if they did nothing wrong, it's important to
473 thoroughly clear him so that people, the public out there don't constantly try to
474 say oh, they covered this...
475
476 Q1: (Unintelligible).
477
478 Q2: ...or they didn't do the investigation they should have. So it sucks to be in your
479 shoes.
480
481 Man: (Unintelligible).
482
483 Q2: I get it. But on the one hand, if everything is on the up and up and so on and
484 so forth, you want this type of scrutiny so that there's never any whispers
485 behind your back about anybody (unintelligible) did he didn't he. You don't
486 want that...
487
488 A: Yeah.
489
490 Q2: ...second guessing is all I'm trying to say, you know? But I meant what I said a
491 little while ago. If you really want to talk to him, I'll give him a call right now.
492 I know where they're at. You know, we can either - they can either come and
493 pick you up and - and go over there or one of us could take you over there to
494 them or they can come here and talk to you, whatever you want if you really
495 are sincere about talking to them and answering questions.
496
497 A: Yeah, I'll answer questions but I don't want to ride in the back of a PFN.
498
499 Q2: No, no, no, no, no.
500
501 A: In the back seat.
502
503 Q2: You wouldn't go in a marked car. You wouldn't go in a - and we wouldn't - we
504 wouldn't do that to you right?

505
506 A: Yeah.
507
508 Q2: You wouldn't be handcuffed, you wouldn't be anything like that. You - they're
509 gonna come in an unmarked car and get you or one of us in an unmarked car
510 would drop you off at the sheriff's office. However they and you want to work
511 that out. I just don't want to make the call and then you say, "You know what?
512 Never mind. I don't want to do it."
513
514 A: Because I mean, I'll be honest right now.
515
516 Q2: Uh-huh.
517
518 A: Oh, go ahead and answer it.
519
520 Q2: Well, let's see who it is first. Sometimes I get telemarketer phone calls. Oh,
521 actually, it's gonna be one of the detectives. So hold on. (Mark)? Hey, where
522 you at?
523
524 Q3: (Unintelligible).
525
526 Q2: Good. Are you at the office?
527
528 Q3: Yeah (unintelligible).
529
530 Q2: Okay. What do you want me to tell Sergeant (Carasco)? Hold on. About - did
531 you want to answer his questions?
532
533 A: Well - well I'll - I'll let you know right now...
534
535 Q2: Okay.
536
537 A: ...deep inside I'm heated. My head's hot. I'm pissed.
538
539 Q2: I get it.
540
541 A: Okay? So I mean I honestly, um, and my mind is going like 1000 miles an
542 hour.
543
544 Q2: Sure.
545

546 A: So if - if - if I say something now that I'm thinking, I'm trying to calm myself
547 down...
548
549 Q2: Sure.
550
551 A: ...I might say something stupid.
552
553 Q2: Okay.
554
555 A: I just realized that if I'm gonna go in for anything, my lawyer says she'll be pr-
556 present.
557
558 Q2: Okay, so you don't want to talk to him without your lawyer?
559
560 A: If that's - if that's - if that's possible. I would really want my lawyer to come.
561
562 Q2: You know what? I mean you're not under arrest, but clearly you have the right
563 to have an attorney present with you.
564
565 A: Okay.
566
567 Q2: Right?
568
569 A: I would - I would rather take that now sir.
570
571 Q2: You would rather have - okay. Um, (Mar)k, are you there? I'm sorry. It's just
572 we had been having a conversation and he was talking about, ah, wanting to
573 answer all your questions...
574
575 A: If my do lawyer - if my lawyer does come within five minutes, hey, let's roll.
576
577 Q2: But - but now he's like, well, you know what? He's better off with his attorney
578 present and that - we all respect that so we understand it. Um, so - so that
579 part's then. He gave us consent to come in.

584 A: There's a (unintelligible) there.
585
586 Q2:
587 And then there's a - what's that? Okay. Yeah, that can stay. Ah, and then

588 there's a laptop that he says he uses so we can take the other one. All right.
589 Um, so, yeah. Anyway, he allowed us in. He's, ah, pointing us to where his
590 uniforms and stuff are at and, ah, the things that were of interest for you.
591 Yeah. And then maybe at some point - no, It doesn't appear to. No. Yeah. And
592 then, um, maybe at some point when he speaks, ah, to his attorney, maybe
593 they'll set up an interview date or something for you but. Yeah. Okay. Okay.
594 Um, maybe outside. I don't know. Yeah. Yeah, I think so. All right. Did you
595 have - before you go, do you have anything you need to ask him, the
596 detective?
597
598 A: No sir.
599
600 Q2: No? Okay. All right. Ah, so I'll let him know that you plan on reaching out to
601 his attorney, ah, on Monday. Okay, bye. So I don't know if you could hear
602 that. But yeah.
603
604 A: Oh yeah.

606 Q2: Ah, totally gets the, ah,
607 attorney thing s and he says he'll call your attorney probably on Monday and
608 try to see if your attorney is willing to have you come in and answer - or give
609 any statement or answer any questions.
610
611 A: All right.

613 Q2: Any questions so far for me?
614
615 A: No. No. I mean.
616
617 Q2: You're doing good as far as holding it in. I - I can - I can imagine how you
618 must be feeling because I can imagine how I might be - would be feeling.
619
620 A: But this - I mean this only happens in the movies man.
621
622 Q2: Yeah. Yeah.
623
624 A: But.
625
626 Q2: And it's of probably little to no consolation to you, but none of us take
627 pleasure in having to do this so.
628
629 A: It's been nasty.

631 Q2: Yeah. It is. It's...

632

633 A: It's your job, right?

634

635 Q2: Yeah, it's - and I'm sure if you were in our shoes you'd be doing the same
636 thing and not necessarily feeling, you know, overjoyed over having to deal
637 with but realizing it has to be done so.

638

639 A: All right. Well, I can imagine if it was some - some dude selling cell phones to
640 inmates. I'll slam him up real quick. But...

641

642 Q2: Yeah. Yeah.

643

644 A: ...man I ain't doing nothing.

645

646 Q2: No, I know.

647

648 A: But I mean it is what it is.

649

650 Q2: It is.

651

652 A: If you guys want to...

653

654 Q2: And let everything run its course and hopefully at the end of the day when it's
655 all said and done everything, you know, will see the light of day. Just gotta
656 move forward from there for all of you to be able to move forward. Yeah. Do
657 you want to show us where the - the bag of clothes are?

658

659 A: I can grab it for you. Ah...

660

661 Q2: Where, in here? No, the one that you said you left downstairs?

662

663 A: Okay. There - there - there might be uniform stuff there...

664

665 Q2: Mm-hm.

666

667 A: ...but I have my Marine Corps stuff there too.

668

669 Man: (Ariano).

670

671 Q2: The uniforms there, are they Class As or are they (unintelligible)?
672
673 A: Ah, you know what? Because just locked them in there I don't know. You
674 want to pull them out?

677 you just wanna wait out there. And like I said, everything that comes out of

808 Q2: No, no, no. But I figured he might be covered with it.

810 A: Yeah. Well that's - well he was covered but I mean if I'm thinking, and I
811 watched the news thing.

815 A: They're saying that there's fecal matter everywhere. I ain't gonna enter that cell
816 if there's shit everywhere.
