**INTERVIEW WITH S1 - LUBRIN**

**Q = Sgt. Carrasco**

**Q1=Man**

**Q2=Woman**

**A = S1-Lubrin**

Man: What's this?

Man: (Unintelligible).

Q: This was your deck, right? That was your - was that your area?

A: Yes, sir.

Q: Alright man. Give us a briefing.

A: Uh, the last call for check, 2315, in the log book, I inspected my (unintelligible), he was on his bed. I did my, uh, 12 o'clock - 12:15 check, 'cause I was eating...

Q: Mh-hm.

A: ...before that, so I (unintelligible). I checked, uh, Cell 39. I see there's feces and then food, and whatever, everywhere. I, uh, he's lying by his door, which is normal for a lot of these guys, 'cause they like to get a TV shot, on the TV. Um, but, sometimes, a lot of them sleep while they - because they were watching TV. So I just hit the door, non-responsive. I - he - I didn't - I was gonna just go back and check on him, because I wanted to complete my welfare check, and then I went back. That's when I kept hitting the door to see if he was gonna wake up. I was hitting it pretty hard. That's when I walk out, um, I come to the door and tell my partner, "I need someone to stand by while I pop this door." Pop the door. Then, you know, I'm shaking him and grab him by his shoulder and non-responsive, so I call it out.

Q: What - I'm sorry, which officer went in with you?

A: Rodriguez.

46 Q: Rodriguez.  
47  
48 A: He was standing post.  
49  
50 Man: Do you have a badge number for Rodriguez?  
51  
52 Q1: 10837.  
53  
54 Man: Thanks.  
55  
56 Q1: Rodriguez.  
57  
58 A: Okay.  
59  
60 Q: So, when you open the door, you shook him, right?  
61  
62 A: Yes, sir.  
63  
64 Q: How did he look?  
65  
66 A: He's, like, he was lying on his side.  
67  
68 Q: Facing the door or facing in?  
69  
70 A: Facing the, uh, like, facing his toilet.  
71  
72 Q: Facing his what? Facing the toilet?  
73  
74 A: Yeah. He wasn't facing outwards towards the back of the cell.  
75  
76 Q: Okay. And what - how did his face look?  
77  
78 A: There was a blank look on his face.  
79  
80 Q: Anything on his face?  
81  
82 A: There was food.  
83  
84 Man: Did it look like his vomit or was it like he'd...  
85  
86 A: It looked like, uh...  
87

88 Q: Like he smeared it or like he threw up?  
89  
90 A: It looked like - you know how the SOS looks like?  
91  
92 Q: Yeah.  
93  
94 A: Food that was actually mashed.  
95  
96 Man: Mh-hm.  
97  
98 Q: It was probably throw up. Um, what about his - the color of, like, his face?  
99  
100 A: Uh, it - it seemed like regular skin color.  
101  
102 Q: Okay.  
103  
104 A: 'Cause he's white.  
105  
106 Q: Alright.  
107  
108 A: He wasn't blue or anything like that. His whole body was the same - the same  
109 color.  
110  
111 Q: Was he stiff?  
112  
113 A: I don't know - I j-...  
114  
115 Q: Or - or you could still move him?  
116  
117 A: (Unintelligible).  
118  
119 Q: You could still move him?  
120  
121 A: I was (unintelligible) move or (unintelligible). He wasn't...  
122  
123 Q: Okay.  
124  
125 A: ...rock hard or anything like that.  
126  
127 Q: Alright. When was pill call?  
128  
129 A: Pill call was...  
130

131 Q1: Did you have a first name?  
132

133 A: ...at, like, (unintelligible), around like 19- 1930, 1940.  
134

135 Q: He gets pills, right?  
136

137 A: Yes.  
138

139 Q: Any problems with his pill call tonight?  
140

141 A: Yes.  
142

143 Q: What happened?  
144

145 A: He tried to cheek...  
146

147 Man: Hang on.  
148

149 A: ...to take his pills, uh, hide 'em. Um, at the time, I was controlling my pill call  
150 through the trace line, and I'm opening doors and trying to control the panel.  
151 And, uh, the nurse notified me. She hit, uh, knocked on the window, um,  
152 saying that he's cheeking something. So I locked my panel and, at this time,  
153 he's going towards his cell, which is something that (unintelligible).  
154 (Unintelligible) go up to his cell, "Have you come back. Come back with us.  
155 Let's go walk back to the - to door." And then - and, uh, in front of the nurse, I  
156 asked, "Where is it?" She points to his, uh, pocket, his brown shirt pocket, and,  
157 um, and this time he's lying. He's - he's - he's calling the nurse a liar. So then I  
158 go in front of him and I say, "Let me see what's inside your pocket." He pulls  
159 out a cup, and then he starts calling her, uh, Satan, and, uh, she's lying. And he  
160 takes his pills, and he walks towards my, uh, SPA box. And then, at this ti- I -  
161 th- th- as we were walking, I'm telling him, "Stop. Open your mouth and let  
162 me see it." And then, um, (unintelligible) and he's - he's, uh, he's...  
163

164 Man: (Unintelligible).  
165

166 A: ...yelling, complained that, um, calling the - the nurse names. Um, he was  
167 saying that, uh, (unintelligible).  
168

169 Man: Um, I don't have the paramedic's name. I think, um, Sergeant Harrington has  
170 that, but, eh, we're a little busy up here. Um...  
171

172 A: And I believe all that - that whole (unintelligible) happened, right.  
173

174 Man: ...can we call you back for that? Alright.  
175  
176 A: (Unintelligible)...  
177  
178 Man: Bye bye.  
179  
180 A: ...but he actually talked to 'em.  
181  
182 Q: So he actually checked some pills, and he actually had some pills in his  
183 pocket, or...  
184  
185 A: Well, at the time - at the time, when I was at my panel...  
186  
187 Q: Uh-huh.  
188  
189 A: ...um, the nurse notified me, like, like knocked on the window, and then  
190 started pointing, I automatically know that's what's he's trying to do.  
191  
192 Q: Mh-hm.  
193  
194 A: So I don't know what he's doing. So - but I see him walking towards his cell,  
195 so I (unintelligible). So that's when (unintelligible).  
196  
197 Q1: F6 Ferris.  
198  
199 Q: And he actually did take his medication then?  
200  
201 Q1: Hey, what's up?  
202  
203 A: He did. But then, it was in front of the nurse...  
204  
205 Q1: No, it's not.  
206  
207 A: ...while he was saying, "She's a liar...  
208  
209 Q1: I - I haven't seen him for a while.  
210  
211 A: ...I took my pills," he takes it out of his pocket...  
212  
213 Q1: Um...  
214  
215 A: ...takes his pills, yells at her more...  
216

217 Q1: Brackett hearing...  
218  
219 A: ...walks away.  
220  
221 Q1: ...then, um, and then IA sergeants? Okay.  
222  
223 Q: Was that normal for him to...  
224  
225 Q1: All right.  
226  
227 Q: ...have problems with his during pill call?  
228  
229 A: Yes. I - I think that's normal behavior for him. He's - he's known to, uh, cheat  
230 meds. The nurses know that he likes to do that.  
231  
232 Q1: Sir, I have the time the nurse...  
233  
234 Q: Pill call?  
235  
236 Q1: ...came on deck.  
237  
238 Q: What was it?  
239  
240 Q1: Um, she came on deck at 1923 hours, uh, Nurse  
241  
242 Q: What time did she leave?  
243  
244 Q1: Um, I'd have to ask (unintelligible).  
245  
246 Q: Okay. Do you know where she went first, or does she...  
247  
248 Q1: Um...  
249  
250 Q: ...oh, yeah, what...  
251  
252 Q1: I was - I - I'm assigned to 6A...  
253  
254 Q: Oh, oh.  
255  
256 Q1: ...so I wasn't out here. I was in my dorm, sir.  
257  
258 A: And he's - he's always like that with (unintelligible) person, and that's, like,  
259 normal - normal behavior for 'em, where he likes to confront the nurse, and  
260 they'll just, uh, he get confrontational, and then he'll just walk away.

261  
262 Q: So that's, like, at, maybe, sometime between like 1930 and 2000, right,  
263 roughly? So like four hours...  
264  
265 Q1: What was that?  
266  
267 Q: ...elapsed after that...  
268  
269 Q1: (Tempra).  
270  
271 Q: ...before you found him down, right?  
272  
273 A: Well, I did my rounds at 0015 hours.  
274  
275 Q: So about four hours, maybe four and a half hours, right? Any interaction with  
276 him, at all, during that four, four and a half hours?  
277  
278 A: Yeah. So I did, uh, uh, a routine security check, uh, where (unintelligible). So  
279 I go through the, uh, I go through every single person's cell. And your  
280 (unintelligible) do quick search. Um, we started at, um, cell 2, the top tier. 48  
281 going down to 47 to 39. Um, when I entered - so me and partner cleared  
282 (unintelligible) when we entered the cell...  
283  
284 Q: So his cell was last?  
285  
286 A: What's that?  
287  
288 Q: So his cell was last then, right? 'Cause he was in Cell 39.  
289  
290 A: No, no, no, no. So from the top tier, we started from Cell 2, 2, 4, 6, 8, 48...  
291  
292 Q: Yeah.  
293  
294 A: ...up top. Down 47...  
295  
296 Q: Then...  
297  
298 A: ...45, 43, so...  
299  
300 Q: Alright.  
301  
302 A: ...we entered - you know, everyone gives up their extras. Um, Cell 39, I  
303 entered his cell. Um, I tell him to get up. He doesn't want to get up, so I tell  
304 him to sit down in the chair...

305  
306 Q1: We have...  
307  
308 A: ...so he sits down in the chair.  
309  
310 Q1: ...release coming out. That's where they keep calling from.  
311  
312 Man: Hold on a second.  
313  
314 Q1: Yeah.  
315  
316 Q: Who? Real quick, which officers were with you?  
317  
318 A: Harris and Rodriguez. 10837, for Rodriguez.  
319  
320 Q1: 621, Escorted Release. (Tempra)? Hey, Release didn't pick up. So you might  
321 need to, um, put him in the - the line-up room.  
322  
323 Q: Okay.  
324  
325 A: So when...  
326  
327 Q: So you told him to get up, he wouldn't get up?  
328  
329 A: He didn't want to get up, so I told him to sit down. And so he did sit down on  
330 his thing. Um, and that's when he started acting - saying, uh, started yelling at  
331 us to get out, get out of his cell. Get out. Um, I (unintelligible) devil.  
332  
333 Q2: He said, "I hate you."  
334  
335 A: Yeah.  
336  
337 Q2: Yeah.  
338  
339 A: And he would - this is, like, normal behavior for him. Um, and, um, yank him  
340 from the (unintelligible) and face the wall. (Unintelligible). Like, he's yelling.  
341 And then he had no extras so we went out. And we just continued on with Cell  
342 2 and (unintelligible), uh, Cell 1. By the time we were done, it was about  
343 2315, which was my last log from my lock inspection. And then I had chow.  
344 And then I did my welfare check around 0012 hours, 00- that's when the - I  
345 did my check. He was just lying there with poop everywhere. Initially, I was  
346 like, "Okay, now I gotta call hazmat because there's food, and there's stuff all  
347 over the walls." So I'm gonna go check everyone else and then come back.  
348 And that - that's when I see him (unintelligible).



349  
350 Q: I'm sorry. What time did you finish the extra clothing? What time was that?  
351  
352 A: The clothing exchange?  
353  
354 Q: No, the extra clothing.  
355  
356 A: (Unintelligible).  
357  
358 Q: You said you were going to each cell.  
359  
360 A: Yes, at 2315.  
361  
362 Q: 2315?  
363  
364 A: Yes. That's when we all walked out for (unintelligible). Last we saw him, he  
365 went - he was lying on his bed.  
366  
367 Q: You said that there were - there was feces and food on the floor, or in his cell?  
368  
369 Q1: Yeah. It smelled.  
370  
371 A: Well, I mean, I don't know exactly what it was, but that's - it was stub-  
372 substance all over the cell.  
373  
374 Q: Like on the walls or just on the floor?  
375  
376 A: Then as I - and then as I walk by, it had that smell, (unintelligible).  
377  
378 Q: Oh, okay.  
379  
380 A: (Unintelligible).  
381  
382 Man: Did you - during that last hour, d- did you hear anything coming from his cell?  
383  
384 A: No.  
385  
386 Man: Anything?  
387  
388 Q: A- af- after that, you went - did you go on lun- did you go on lunch aft- after  
389 that 2315?  
390  
391 A: Well, I was gonna have my (unintelligible) have my food in here.  
392

393 Q1: F6, this is Ferris.  
394  
395 Man: Oh, so you ate here?  
396  
397 A: Yes, sir.  
398  
399 Q1: I have not heard that, sir. Yeah. But the, um...  
400  
401 Q: (Unintelligible).  
402  
403 Q1: ...oh, yeah, yeah. Alright.  
404  
405 Q: Anything?  
406  
407 Man: Nope.  
408  
409 Q1: Thanks.  
410  
411 Q: (Unintelligible) (Davis)?  
412  
413 Man: Good.  
414  
415 Q: (Shawn).  
416  
417 Man: (Unintelligible).  
418  
419 Q: (Marcais)?  
420  
421 Man: Mm-mm.  
422  
423 Q: (Unintelligible).  
424  
425 Man: I'm good.  
426  
427 Man: No sir.  
428  
429 Man: (Unintelligible).  
430  
431 Q: Do you have anything to add?  
432  
433 Man: Um, you know if guys need any, uh, time of death is 0035 hours...  
434

435 Q: Okay. Well, hold on. So - you bring up a good point - so you made the call  
436 over your - your radio?  
437  
438  
439 Man: Can you hit this  
440  
441 A: Yes, sir.  
442  
443 Q: Or on the phone?  
444  
445 A: On my radio.  
446  
447 Q: Over your radio? Okay. Man down?  
448  
449 A: Yes.  
450  
451 Man: Oh, yeah. Yeah, man down.  
452  
453 Man: At 0012 hours.  
454  
455 Man: Yeah.  
456  
457 A: (Unintelligible).  
458  
459 Q: Okay.  
460  
461 Man: And then, um, you started CPR and then Strickland got the AED?  
462  
463 A: Yes.  
464  
465 Q: You started CPR?  
466  
467 A: Yes, sir. I started doing, uh...  
468  
469 Q: And Rodriguez was still with you?  
470  
471 A: Yeah, I think.  
472  
473 Q: Your confidence is overwhelming.  
474  
475 A: Well, here - here's the thing, okay, that...  
476  
477 Q1: 'Cause I was in my dorm.  
478

479 Q: Yeah.  
480  
481 A: ...I - I - Rodriguez was the first to respond.  
482  
483 Q1: Mh-hm.  
484  
485 A: With me, but that whole incident was my first time, and I just - all I know, I  
486 just started doing compressions.  
487  
488 Q: Started pumping, huh?  
489  
490 Man: Who brought the AED?  
491  
492 Q: And who brought the AED?  
493  
494 A: Strickland.  
495  
496 Q: Strickland.  
497  
498 Q1: There was multiple AEDs in there. Our floor station's, uh, AED is missing,  
499 but I believe Strickland might have used the AED from F1...  
500  
501 Man: (Unintelligible).  
502  
503 Q1: ...down at the, um, the (unintelligible).  
504  
505 Q: So yours is missing? You don't know where it is?  
506  
507 Q1: There's multiple...  
508  
509 Q: There's multiple in there.  
510  
511 Q1: ...AEDs in the...  
512  
513 Q: Okay.  
514  
515 Q1: ....module that were brought in...  
516  
517 Q: Okay.  
518  
519 Q1: ...during the man down.  
520  
521 Man: So that when medical staff arrived, anyone started doing breaths on him, CPR.  
522

523 Q: Yeah, who arrived...  
524  
525 A: Nurses.  
526  
527 Man: Nurses.  
528  
529 Q: ...nurses came first, right?  
530  
531 A: Yes, sir.  
532  
533 Q: Okay.  
534  
535 A: (Unintelligible) before you guys, all the, uh, the times, I was just...  
536  
537 Q: Just working, right?  
538  
539 A: Yes, sir.  
540  
541 Man: Well, three nurses that were there are - are and then  
542 and then And he's the manager.  
543  
544 Q:  
545  
546 Man: That's it,  
547  
548 Q: Oh, okay.  
549  
550 Man: So he was the manager. He's the one that, I think, he did the final report you  
551 gave to, uh, Brackett. So he was the m- he was the main guy in there. Um...  
552  
553 Q: So who was the first nurse before ?  
554  
555 Man: Uh...  
556  
557 Q2:  
558  
559 Q1:  
560  
561 Q:  
562  
563 Man: And then, uh, Paramedic Number 17, arrived. And so did  
564 Fire...  
565  
566 Q1: Fire 7.

567  
568 Man: Fire 7.  
569  
570 Q1: And EMS 17.  
571  
572 Man: Yeah. And 17, uh, the paramedic, uh, pronounced death,  
573 and the badge number is  
574  
575 Q: What time did you say?  
576  
577 Man: 0035.  
578  
579 Man: Um...  
580  
581 Q: What time was they 10-97?  
582  
583 Man: You got that? 10-97?  
584  
585 Man: Can I get the - the name?  
586  
587 Man: Oh.  
588  
589 Man:  
590  
591 Man:  
592  
593 Man: And his badge?  
594  
595 Man: Is  
596  
597 Man: Let's see medic...  
598  
599 Q: Looks like they arrived, uh, EMS arrived at 0023 hours.  
600  
601 Man: Fire at 0027 hours.  
602  
603 Q: Okay.  
604  
605 Man: (Josh), I gotta use the restroom.  
606  
607 Man: Um, besides the body fluids on the walls and the floor and stuff, just on first  
608 glance, is there anything weird about the cell? Maybe be notes flying around,  
609 unusual items? Anything that looked funny about it?  
610

611 Q: Prior, like, uh, suicide attempts, that you know of?  
612

613 A: No.  
614

615 Q: How long had he been in the unit?  
616

617 A: Uh, at least, (unintelligible).  
618

619 Q: A month? Has he been in there the whole time?  
620

621 A: Yes.  
622

623 Q: The same type of problems with him?  
624

625 A: With him, normal behavior is him lashing out at nurses, and then calm. And  
626 then, you have those (unintelligible) go through the trash. He likes to dig  
627 through the trash. He likes to, uh, stand by the door.  
628

629 Q: Mh-hm.  
630

631 A: I tell him, "Hey, man, get away from the door." He's like, "Alright." And then  
632 he goes back. But, I think, you can't yell at the guy 'cause he's - he's - he  
633 doesn't seem like he's all there. So when he was cheeking his pills, I wasn't - I  
634 wasn't gonna yell at him. I wasn't using force on him, because that's just how  
635 he is. And he's like, "Oh, sorry. I didn't know I was cheeking pills." Things  
636 like that. Just like when we were inside the cell, he's like, "Get out, get out.  
637 Get out of my cell." "Like, you already know, I mean, this is procedure. Get  
638 me your extras." And that's it.  
639

640 Q: So when you did clothing exchange, you talked about, yeah, maybe doing a  
641 little bit of a search, you know, looking for, like, extras, stuff like that.  
642

643 A: Clothing exchange.  
644

645 Q: How - how well is that search? How - how good is that search?  
646

647 A: Clothing exchange is - is separate. So I get clothing exchange and he came  
648 down. And it's after that program, and when they're all locked down, that's  
649 when I go and I get their extras.  
650

651 Q: Uh-huh. And how good was - do you, like, search their cells and all? How  
652 well do you search their cells?  
653

654 A: I search - I search like first their beds. If their mattresses are ripped, I check  
655 the side.  
656  
657 Q: So pretty good?  
658  
659 A: I'd say, yeah.  
660  
661 Q: No, uh, no pills?  
662  
663 A: I don't...  
664  
665 Q: No extra pills in his cell?  
666  
667 A: Okay, so, if I'm looking - when I'm looking for clothes, clothing stands out,  
668 okay. When it comes to pills, they have so much trash they can hide it in  
669 anything. They hide it in, like, uh, carry bags They'll fill cups, it's...  
670  
671 Q: But nothing that you noticed tonight?  
672  
673 A: Nothing out of the ordinary, because he - he has - he had a dirty cell.  
674  
675 Q: Okay. So he's not real kept, huh?  
676  
677 A: No, he's not.  
678  
679 Man: (Unintelligible).  
680  
681 Man: Yeah, that's what we do. Embrace it.  
682  
683 Q: Anybody have any other questions?  
684  
685 Man: You know anybody who owns a (unintelligible)?  
686  
687 A: No, he - he...  
688  
689 Man: That's a (unintelligible) thing.  
690  
691 A: I don't know. I know one thing for sure, he's never used the phone.  
692  
693 Man: Okay.  
694  
695 A: He goes on the phone and he's like, "Bah, bah, bah, bah, bah, bah."  
696 (Unintelligible), and he does that every single phone call.  
697



698 Man: He, uh...  
699  
700 A: He has no concept.  
701  
702 Q2: I - I'm sorry, I - I missed - what time did they call the time of death?  
703  
704 Man: 0035 hours.  
705  
706 Q2: Thank you very much.  
707  
708 A: He has, uh, well, he doesn't really hang out with anyone. He - he walks alone  
709 (unintelligible). He never gets closer. He doesn't even get - I - I don't even see  
710 him get (unintelligible). He likes to get in the trash. He likes to dig for coffee.  
711  
712 Q2: Mh-hm.  
713  
714 A: (Unintelligible).  
715  
716 Q2: No?  
717  
718 A: (Unintelligible).  
719  
720 Q: Does he - do you know if he gets commissary? Does he have any money to  
721 get commissary?  
722  
723 A: I've never seen him. He doesn't like to shower. He doesn't want to exchange  
724 clothing.  
725  
726 Man: Do we know - is there anything on record that says that he is diagnosed with  
727 particular, ah, mental condition?  
728  
729 Man: (Unintelligible).  
730  
731 A: I don't know. (unintelligible). I'm not (unintelligible) that long.  
732  
733 Q: And they're not gonna tell us.  
734  
735 Man: Not you.  
736  
737 Man: I know they aren't. I'll just go home. See you guys there.  
738  
739 Q: Yeah.  
740

741 Q2: I think the psych referral that was in that packet had - had mentioned that  
742 there was a history of, like, mental health issues.  
743  
744 Man: A lot of these guys (unintelligible).  
745  
746 Q2: W- well, he's, uh, he's  
747  
748 Q: Mh-hm.  
749  
750 Q2:  
751  
752  
753 Q:  
754  
755 Q2: Yeah, so he's psych. He's - he's special management, psych inmate.  
756  
757 Man: It's part of the gig.  
758  
759 Q: Well, it says right here too.  
760  
761 Q2: Okay.  
762  
763 Q: "Special management - permit to help but PC has him override."  
764  
765 Man: Otherwise, you're one of the guys who puts, like, a (unintelligible).  
766  
767 Q: (Unintelligible) materials, like feces and (unintelligible).  
768  
769 Q2: But - because he's a sex offender, probably.  
770  
771 Man: Yeah, full crazy.  
772  
773 Q: Oh, and he does have EPS history.  
774  
775 Q2: Okay.  
776  
777 Man: He's got a lot. (Unintelligible).  
778  
779 Man: Dude, like, 6 to 8 from him. Right?  
780  
781 Q: Gosh, you see, history. "August 1st - during clothing exchange became  
782 confrontational."  
783  
784 Q2: Which, y- you know, that - that's typical...

785  
786 Q: Yeah.  
787  
788 Q2: ...8B type of behavior, you know. You're like one step below 8A. So...  
789  
790 Q: Uh.  
791  
792 A: They don't have his - his (unintelligible).  
793  
794 Q2: No, they don't.  
795  
796 A: (Unintelligible) module over here.  
797  
798 Q2: Right, right. And that's how 6A used to be too, was, like, kind of an overflow.  
799  
800 Man: Is Unit 6B called something special, like a special...  
801  
802 Q2: It's just PC Dorm.  
803  
804 Man: Just PC Dorm?  
805  
806 Q2: Yeah  
807  
808 Q: Okay.  
809  
810 Q2: But, you know, you might have a - just a mixture - I mean, gosh, I d- I don't  
811 know, is - when I worked 6A, it was kind of, like the melting pot of....  
812  
813 A: There's - there's a huge...  
814  
815 Q: Now it's more...  
816  
817 Q2: ...of, uh...  
818  
819 A: ...huge divide of, uh, sophisticated.  
820  
821 Q2: Mh-hm.  
822  
823 A: And then, special management. There's - there's - it's not a, kinda sorta, it's a,  
824 uh, and you see it when I program they'd all sit right in front of me.

828 A: Does he get along?

830 Q: Does he get into it? Does he get along with? Does d- they probably don't go  
831 around him much, do they?

833 A: They don't go around 'cause he's...

837 A: Exactly.

839 Q: Any confrontations? Verbals, physicals with anybody?

841 A: That night I don't know. On my shift, because he hovers around me, like my  
842 shift, and he stays right by the door I (unintelligible). (Unintelligible).

844 Q2: (Jason), I think I saw, it was either a custody input report or a re-housing  
845 report, where he had a verbal in 415 with an inmate. I don't know...
