This was your deck, right? That was your - was that your area?

Alright man. Give us a briefing.
Uh, the last call for check, 2315, in the log book, I inspected my (unintelligible), he was on his bed. I did my, uh, 12 o'clock - 12:15 check,

A: ...before that, so I (unintelligible). I checked, uh, Cell 39. I see there's feces and then food, and whatever, everywhere. I, uh, he's lying by his door, which is normal for a lot of these guys, 'cause they like to get a TV shot, on the TV. Um, but, sometimes, a lot of them sleep while they - because they were watching TV. So I just hit the door, non-responsive. I - he - I didn't - I was gonna just go back and check on him, because I wanted to complete my welfare check, and then I went back. That's when I kept hitting the door to see if he was gonna wake up. I was hitting it pretty hard. That's when I walk out, um, I come to the door and tell my partner, "I need someone to stand by while I pop this door." Pop the door. Then, you know, I'm shaking him and grab him by his shoulder and non-responsive, so I call it out.

He wasn't blue or anything like that. His whole body was the same - the same color.

(Unintelligible) go up to his cell, "Have you come back. Come back with us. Let's go walk back to the - to door." And then - and, uh, in front of the nurse, I asked, 'Where is it?" She points to his, uh, pocket, his brown shirt pocket, and, um, and this time he's lying. He's - he's - he's calling the nurse a liar. So then I go in front of him and I say, "Let me see what's inside your pocket." He pulls out a cup, and then he starts calling her, uh, Satan, and, uh, she's lying. And he takes his pills, and he walks towards my, uh, SPA box. And then, at this ti- I -th- th- as we were walking, I'm telling him, "Stop. Open your mouth and let me see it." And then, um, (unintelligible) and he's - he's, uh, he's...

Um, we started at, um, cell 2, the top tier. 48 going down to 47 to 39 . Um, when I entered - so me and partner cleared (unintelligible) when we entered the cell...

So his cell was last?

So his cell was last then, right? 'Cause he was in Cell 39.
No, no, no, no. So from the top tier, we started from Cell 2, 2, 4, 6, 8, 48...
Yeah.
...up top. Down 47...
Then...
...45, 43, so...
Alright.
...we entered - you know, everyone gives up their extras. Um, Cell 39, I entered his cell. Um, I tell him to get up. He doesn't want to get up, so I tell him to sit down in the chair...

By the time we were done, it was about 2315, which was my last log from my lock inspection. And then I had chow. And then I did my welfare check around 0012 hours , 00 - that's when the - I did my check. He was just lying there with poop everywhere. Initially, I was like, "Okay, now I gotta call hazmat because there's food, and there's stuff all over the walls." So I'm gonna go check everyone else and then come back. And that - that's when I see him (unintelligible).

So when he was cheeking his pills, I wasn't - I wasn't gonna yell at him. I wasn't using force on him, because that's just how he is. And he's like, "Oh, sorry. I didn't know I was cheeking pills." Things like that. Just like when we were inside the cell, he's like, "Get out, get out. Get out of my cell." "Like, you already know, I mean, this is procedure. Get

So when you did clothing exchange, you talked about, yeah, maybe doing a little bit of a search, you know, looking for, like, extras, stuff like that.

How - how well is that search? How - how good is that search?
Clothing exchange is - is separate. So I get clothing exchange and he came down. And it's after that program, and when they're all locked down, that's

Uh-huh. And how good was - do you, like, search their cells and all? How well do you search their cells?

A: I search - I search like first their beds. If their mattresses are ripped, I check the side.
