A: I didn't. My workday is today. Um, I had an English muffin and coffee for breakfast. I was out the door and we went in. We regularly work out, work out for about an hour and a half. After work out, team briefing. After team briefing, we went to uh, lunch, went to Chipotle, had a full lunch. That was around say 1 o'clock. And after 1 o'clock, I went back to the office, did a little bit of a follow up and went out to the field.

Okay. And those magazines would be on your duty belt or in within your tac vest?

A: Yeah, I had two on my tac vest. I moved them up from my duty belt to my tac vest or my actual raid vest, and then, uh, had one in my - my, uh, belt.

Do you how many bullets each magazine holds?
Thirteen plus one in the chamber.
Do you have 13 plus one or...
Yeah.

Okay. All right, I think we can start with, uh - so I already asked you how you started your day. Um, anything to, uh - when you got to work, you said you worked out and then sort of just take me from there.

A: Okay. We went into the office. We did a briefing. Sergeant went over admin
stuff, normal, passing out paperwork, talking about new things to the unit. A couple of officers came to our team. So just talking about kinda things that we do, how we - how we roll, kind of priorities that we put out there. After our briefing, um, I let my sergeant know that I had some work that I wanted to do for the day. And he gave me the go ahead. So after that, uh, we went out to lunch. I had reporting back from lunch. We we're going to come back to the office. I was going to do some follow up like I said. Um, did some work on the computer, pulled up from my systems, and got an ops plan ready for what we had going on today. After that, I probably did I rallied the troops up, let them know what I had going on. And uh, we went and met in the field and I did a briefing.

Okay. And just for clarification, um, these are the people that are on your team and every day that you work?

Q: Okay. And can we discuss a little bit about the briefing?
A. Uh, sergeant briefing? My briefing?

A: Uh, sergeant briefing was just talking about, like I said, some admin stuff. Um, went over uh, some of the do's and don'ts of the team. One - two of the guys are new on our team. So we just kind of go over uh, like um, you know, be proactive and don't be known as someone who is hiding. We help each other out. It's very team-oriented when we deal with the officers, and we have to have each other's back all the time. Um, just talking about augmenting patrols since we're short-staff now, whenever we can, go out and you know, kind of would be with them as much as we can as possible. Um, talking about out main objective, gangs and drugs right now. We've got a huge influx of gang violence in San Jose. So that's a big thing for us. It's probably our number one thing. Um, we like to get, uh - just go out every day in the hopes of taking bad guys to jail. That's what we do.

Q: Um, during the briefing as well, uh, did you talk about any sort of um, ops plans, or things that may have been happening that shift or have you talked anything that...

Yeah, I had a - I brought it up to my sergeant, and I've gotten info from an informant of mine...

...that he had some info on a 187 that occured about a week earlier. Through follow up, I was able to ID someone as a possible suspect. I dealt on homicide, did the interview of my CI the day prior and uh, with already some of the information that he gave. We - between what we got from him and what
the homicide detectives had, it sounded like a really good lead. And so I did some - like I said, I did follow up. ID'd a person - well, the person that the the informant gave me - ID'd him. Uh, ID'd an address where he's staying. And with that, I told him I don't why we conduct some surveillance and see if we can see him coming in and out. He's known to drive stolen cars all the time, and he's supposed to be still in possession of a weapon which matches the weapon that's used in the homicide. So that's - I had brought that to the table. My sergeant said the at looked good - got some good info. We definitely want to run with that. And that's when I did the follow up. Did some computer systems, generating officer operations plan.

Q: Do you remember what that person's name was? The suspect?
A: $\quad$ The suspect? Elias Mejia. He goes by the, uh, street name of Johnny Angel.
Q: And you had just mentioned that the homicide that conducts the interview with your CI and sort of correlated some of the information that he had told you.

A: Correct. He gave me some info. I contacted investigator in homicide. And none of the information that he had actually been released, so he brought the information to us. So with that data in correlation of the evidence, definitely was a good possibility that the suspect was who he was pointing to.

Okay. And did that confidential informant tell you uh, the suspect, Mr. Mejia?
A: Yes.
Q: Did he give information as to where he thought he might have been staying, or was that something that you did through the computer work now?

A: He informed me that his brother and family members live at the address.

And so that's where I went and I got that with his nickname, and then some tattoos and he knew his first name. Um, ID'd him. Showed him a picture. He positively ID'd him. And we went from there. Did some follow up on the house. We ran full complete by everyone in the house. And I mean we did a complete work up on everything, every person in the house associated to it.

A: I did a complete work up prior - I did a complete work up on the Sunday. I identified the suspect on Sunday. And I did a work up on him, getting the address, address. I - uh, just being thorough, did a, uh, RMS on the address. Got every email of the person in the last 10 years, ran every person out, and did a complete work on all those people as well just so we knew it was a player or not.

Yeah, he was actually listing his - probably for the last I'd say maybe five to seven years those were all his emergency contacts, and was listed as mother, relative, parent, I think another one was like a relative. So it correlated with my CI had told me that his parents and his brother lives there. I did confirm that his mom - that his - she does live there, and that was listed as emergency contact. Did a full work up on her as well. And that's how we related that address to him.

Now when you said you did a complete work up. Is that part of your uh, assignment that you had mentioned to your sergeant, or was that complete work have done prior to informing your sergeant that this is a...

We did that today.
Did anybody help you?
Uh, yes. Yvonne DeLa Cruz. And also uh, Officer Pifferini helped as well.
And part of your uh, computer database search of the suspect, is it actually um, that he had an address at Mount Shasta as well?

Okay. But that wasn't his known address, like for DNB or any other...
No. He doesn't even - his was just random addresses.
Okay. Did the CI say that he was also living there, or that's just where his parents are staying?

Okay.

Q: Tell me a little bit about, um, once you found out about this person that that's where he lives? What criminal he was further?

A: Once we started looking into him, uh, Officer White, who's also on our team, he brought to my attention that he recognized the suspect or the person, that he ran across him uh, district 12s when we worked in patrol together. And then when he brought that up, I actually recognized the guy as well. We got information probably two years ago that the guy deals with stolen cars and likes to run from the police and stuff. So about two years ago, we kind of setup on the same thing. And the guy actually fled in a vehicle on us, and we were able to um, arrest him at a later time. But that was, like I said, probably two years ago. And he fled in a stolen car that time as well. Uh, during the search, we found - and we did a whole C check on him - prior to 148 , um, 1851. He has a quite a big history. His history and information are, you know (unintelligible)...

A: ...law here. He's been in and out. And he's pretty young for having such a long history, too.

Q: $\quad$ Any specific crimes, or violence, or weapons that you sort of remember?
A: Uh, not at the top of my head. I don't remember any, uh, any big violent crimes, no.

Q: And certainly the CI had informed you that um, he was possible suspect of a 187?

How recent was this 187 ?

This happened last Monday.
So, very recent?
A: Yeah. It was our last homicide and it was the - I believe it was the last homicide. It was the one that happened on Murtha where the uh, the victim was shot in the chest with a small caliber ammunition.

Q: And when you say this is uh, a CI of yours, um, that CI actually contact you and offer this information, or is it something that you have talked to the CI
and...

A: He's actually a reliable informant - informant that I've been working for awhile, um, doing kind of a key consideration over him. He's provided information in the past. He came to me - he always check in with me just to make sure things are running up and up. I'm good with his probation officer as well. He's on probation. So I make sure that he's going to - he goes to parenting classes. Um, he has check in with her often. So I make sure that he does a - so he called me. He kind of questioned me about, hey, did they ever catch anyone on the homicide that happened on Murtha? He's very intertwined with all the people that live in over in that area, all the different mounds, Murtha. So you know, I don't know, I have no idea about it. He started giving me information. Uh, he had some very specific information that wasn't in the news and that I didn't tell him. I called homicide. He tells me pretty much I - that guy is on the spot. I don't know how he got that info. So he obviously heard it on the street, or he knows a little bit more. We called him in, and uh, he informs us that he was at a house and this person, Johnny Angel, showed up with a gun. He pulled the gun out, and uh, after smoking dope, smoking meth, he pulled a gun up, pulled up a huge fixed-blade knife, sets it on a table, starts talking about it, starts talking a little bit more in depth about the homicide. And it was kind of a vague situation. And so he left it at that. So um, with that information, that's what we went on, the fact that knowing he has a caliber. The guy showed a gun that matches the description, the caliber. So that's where we went.

Q: $\quad$ Can you talk to me a little about um, after you did all the work up on that house? Um, were you the one that actually got an ops order together or did you consult your sergeant? Sort of take me through that?

A: Well, uh, I put an ops plan together (unintelligible). I put an ops plan together. Um, it was - we were going to do - pretty much like I said, we were, uh, going to conduct surveillance on the house.

Q: Okay.
A: He's known to be in possession of a stolen vehicles. It's his thing. He's known on the streets of he likes stolen cars, and he supposed to like guns. So he tells people on the street that he can get them either. He likes it. Um, he was - the last time my CI actually was around him, he was in a stolen car. Um, he was no longer in that stolen car. So I put it together, informed everyone, hey, this guy rolls in stolen cars. That's what he does. It's his MO. He's possibly stole other - stole with a gun. I don't know if he's gotten rid of it. If he likes guns that much, I highly doubt in fact that he was going to get rid of a gun. I mean, I didn't know if he was hot. So that was a possibility. He's going to be in a stolen car, and he's possibly got a gun. So our objective, conduct surveillance.

If we get him out the car, if he is in a stolen car, we can follow. We didn't want to do anything at the house just because providing the history on the house, uh, there's another, uh, a pool lead that comes back there. His younger brother is actually doing time right now for a 66197. And there's a huge history on him. And he's also, and the other family,

So I think his mother's ex-husband. And myself and other officers, senior officers, they know the family pretty well. They've been in and out. So our plan was to get him away from the house. Um, as soon as we get him in a safe area, uh, conduct a car stop. And at that point, ID him, try to get some info from him. If we can oddly over any charges. We can uh, take him to custody then. But we definitely were going to call the homicide investigator, and you know, have him have a little chat them, see if he can get - pull any info from him.

Okay. And you ran this to your sergeant prior to...
A: $\quad$ Correct, yeah. I did the whole work up. Uh, we met in the field. He read it over. And uh, it was good to go. We were - we set up on it. So he did the whole reading, uh, proofread, and then made - we all in our contacts. He created an event for us.

Q: $\quad$ When did you - did you have the briefing at the station or it was on the field?
A: We met in the field. We were all kind of doing different things at that point. I was in the office with a couple of officers. And the other officers had to do some stuff in the field. We ended up meeting at the - by the Moose Lodge at the uh, southwest corner of Martin and Mount Pleasant.

A: Uh, between 1600. Yeah, we had set for 1600.

Okay. If you can remember, can you remember what the assignments were for that - for that uh, order?

A: Yeah. We uh, we actually couldn't get, uh - we didn't have enough cars originally. So um, we kind of - we wanted to put people together, we can have every single person in a different car. It didn't work out that way. We didn't want to spread everyone as thin. So I had Officer Pifferini and Officer DeLa Cruz. They stayed in a two-man vehicle. Myself, and officer Barthelemy, we stayed in a two-man vehicle. Officer White was by himself.

Sergeant Archer is in a white um, Chevy Tahoe. And Officer (Porter) is in a blue, dark, dark blue van. It's a Dodge Caravan.

Q: Yeah, we're going to take a quick break. It's approximately 1:45. I'm going to stop the recorder. Sorry. You can hang out in here if you want.

If you don't mind, I'll take it.

Okay. Thank you. Okay, we're going to reconvene. Stepped out here for a few - maybe about a minute, so it's approximately 1:46. And just to uh, recap the last question, I believe I asked, was um, asking the vehicle that was behind to the unit. If I could ask what (Flores) was driving. (Flores) was driving a Dodge Caravan? You said dark blue?

Q: Okay. After the briefing, uh - why don't you go ahead and go from there?
A: After briefing, we left. Briefing was about 30 minutes I think. Uh, we had put into motion that (Flores) was going to be point. He was going to be dropped by Officer Barthelemy. Um, the plan was after he drops Officer (Flores), he's going to walk southbound to Mount McKinley, and I was going to pick him up on Mount McKinley. We did so. We - I picked him up, and point was set. He got - he got the spot we wanted. He was on the west curb line, facing southbound across from the address. Very good eye of the address, so that was good. After I picked up Officer Barthelemy, I drove to the - our north compass point to which I was going to take up. And I parked on Mount Vista. And I was positioned on the north curb line facing west on Mount Vista at Mount Lassen

What was that last street?

Thank you. And you sat there and was monitoring radio traffic?
A: Monitoring radio traffic. Um, the house is pretty stagnant for a while. There is an older gentleman that came out a couple of times seen sweeping the driveway area. He was milling around. It was put out on the radio. It was a negative on our primary. I'd say after about maybe two hours - no - yeah, I'd say maybe two hours, approximately two hours, um, I was sitting there. Um, Officer (Flores) put out traffic that a white Honda pulled into the driveway. As standard operating procedure, he put out the license plate. Our sergeant was the only one with an actual MDT in his vehicle. So he runs it through our sergeant. He gave the plate. After a few minutes, our sergeant came back with a return, the plate was success. That's all we want for you know, stolen
vehicle. At that point, we kind of started pressing Officer (Flores) if he get a good eye. Um, according to our CI or my CI, the suspect, Johnny Angel, had a long bushy hair, and he has - and it's the last time I actually ran in contact with him as well, it kind of looks like (Fragel Bob). It's weird, afro kind of thing going. He has very distinctive tattoos on his neck and he had them on his arms. And so on the neck, he kind of like half finished tattoo. I think it's supposed to be a bash. But it kind of stopped on the a trigger. I think it got a little too painful for him or something. So he put that out. And tattoo - he's got tattoos kind of matching the description, but he doesn't have the hair, you know, I can't make a positive. Nothing - being apart in our unit, you know, if you don't get a $100 \%$, then it's not a positive. I made the decision due to the fact that he's got a matching tattoo descriptions, same height, same kind of weight, and the fact that he pulled up to the address in a stolen car matches the same MO. So I make the decision. I get a hold of my sergeant, I tell him, hey uh, we're going with it. He says okay. We make the plan, and it falls in motion pretty much as the ops plan says. We're going to follow him away from the address. Um, we want to tail him and just continue surveillance on the vehicle, see where he goes. If we can get him to an area where it's safe enough for, uh, us to take him off, or do a car down, then we were going to do so. At that time, he sat - I'd say maybe 10 minutes he was at the driveway. Um, he put - that he goes in the house, comes back out. I believe he goes back to the front porch, goes in the house again. Comes back out. At this time, he gets back into the car. Car backed up, goes northbound. I was northbound.

Q: This is all stuff that you're - it's not under the trigger. I know...
This is on the radio. Uh, once he goes northbound, he gets probably a couple I would say 100,150 yards kind of minimum. He was like - he puts up the exact description of the vehicle. Um, the vehicle comes. There's no vehicle coming on the street northbound. All of a sudden, the - I see - I catch eyes on the primary, occupied by two, white Honda. It turns towards me and starting to head eastbound on Mount Vista. I drop my seat back. He drives past us, continuing on Mount Vista. Um, I uh - I put it on radio I'm going with him. I turned around. I start following the car, and I take him for a couple of turns. And I queued up just behind him. And we get to about - he drives through the whole mountain area and get back out on to Clayton. We get to Clayton. We started going northbound. Um, we get to about Clayton and Story. He turns at eastbound on story, and I kind of lose sight of him for a second. All of a sudden, I'm driving eastbound Story, and I completely lose him. And I'm looking around because there's no way I could've lost him. He's right here. My next unit up was Officer White. He's following him behind me. He picks the car up. Um, at this point we're thinking, he's kind of maybe doing counter surveillance. He's just fallen back, he's going to go back on his tracks. We follow him out. He continues. He ends up turning down on a small side street, comes back onto Story. At this point, I turned off. And I'm just waiting for
him to come by. He goes again eastbound on Story and turned - I'm forget all the names, but he turned on 50 different left and rights. And the whole time he's driving, he - it almost looked like he's doing counter surveillance, but he's not to be stopping. He's using the road, he's using his blinker. And so it's kind of - it's getting real suspicious. We're like, yeah - we're thinking he makes a - I know he didn't make me right away. Um, the unit. Pifferini and DeLa Cruz say hey, he's made us, he knows we're here. But he doesn't try and take off or anything. Um, we get to a stop sign closer to East Hills, and we're driving all through the - the city streets area. We get closer to East Hills. He turns back to me at a stop sign. I was back away. And he looks right at me. Doesn't speed up, doesn't do anything. So I'm thinking, I'm made, yeah, I'm done. So I clean up. Next unit, uptakes him again. I catch back up to him again. We're behind him. Doesn't speed up. Doesn't do anything. He just is making circles. And uh, it's almost like he's wanting to lead us on like a little - you know, just make us follow the leader. So we follow and follow and follow and keep on. Finally, I think it was my sergeant puts it out, like hey, he's made us, you know. We're going to - we're going to have to box him in somewhere around here. He gets back into small road, and he makes circle on a street, and he makes four lanes, he comes back out the same street, starts going - at this point, those are kind of candid. They're kind of southeast street, northwest, they're kind of at an angle. So I'm going to say he was going in a western direction. Um, at this time, he kind of picks it up a little bit. My sergeant is number one. The vehicle is primary, suspect vehicle. My sergeant is directly behind him on point. Directly behind my sergeant is Officer White. And behind Officer White is myself and (Marconi). Um, as we're following, uh, just so happens, Pifferini and DeLa Cruz happened to - they kind of lose us after cleaning up. They in a point back on the street, just so happens they pull up right in front of the suspect. They slowed down their car, kind of do some maneuvers just to slow his car down. They do some side to side. The suspect turns, tries to go around him. They turn right, block him and they come to a complete stop. Um, and actually during this whole thing, uh, we knew that it was our primary way before, before we were even burned on this. Officer DeLa Cruz who actually knows the handling and knows this gentlemen, and she actually helped me on the work up - she probably ID'd the guy's tattoos and said, yeah, he has short hair now. That's definitely positive. He did some counter him and came right back on, and drove by each other extremely slow. And she lets it off what's on the radio, spotted armed suspect. That's who it is. He's driver. So jumping back forward...

Q: That was DeLa Cruz, right?
A: DeLa Cruz, correct. Um, as he finally comes to a stop, as Pifferini and DeLa Cruz are kind of doing the side back, back and forth, suspect starts coming to a stop. He realizes that they did that. My sergeant turns on his - takes down, lights the sirens. The vehicle in front of me, Officer White, turns his on. Um, I
turned my on. We have a full takedown or takedown equipped. We have flashing lights in the lights. And the headlights. We have a dropdown visor. It's down red and blue lights. And I can see all the cars in front of me are also illuminated. Uh, the vehicle, as we all come to a stop, uh, Sergeant Archer pulled up right behind him, and uh, the vehicle at this time is trying to - the suspect vehicle is trying to back up real quick. So Sergeant Archer slams on his brakes. And at that point, uh, Officer White's car - and I watched his car, I don't know if his ABS locked up or something, he just starts like you know when your ABS is locked? Da , da, da. But it was doing it extremely hard. And I'm watching his car shake really bad. Uh, he comes in, rear ends the sergeant. Uh, at that point, I'm coming behind him. I'm offset on his passenger side my driver's side, his passenger side. The suspect is driving probably about 50 miles an hour that was like backwards, back into Officer White on his passenger side, driver door - I mean, his passenger side front door, and his passenger side rear door. Hits his car, ping-pongs off of him. I come to a position, and I come to a stop to where I'm thinking there's no way the guy can get in between our cars. It's probably only a foot and a half. He hits my car going about, I'd say 15 or 20 miles an hour in reverse. He hits my car so hard that it pushes me back probably about 10 feet, and then came at my vehicle at a side angle. At this point, he's able to get his car in between my car and Officer White's car, and continued backing up, and he whips it around and back completely sideways. This time, there's really nowhere that he could go because my car is - our cars are blocking to the fact that we're close enough to where the parked cars on the south curb line...

## Q: Okay. Mm-hm.

## Q:

...you wouldn't be able to fit a vehicle. So there's really nowhere he can go. He just backs up. Well, he backs up his - the car. It was - it was like a black minivan, I think it was a black - it was a minivan. It was like a black car I think. He backed into that car. When he hit me, I tell Bruce to get out because I'm thinking in my head this guy's going on foot now. There's no way he's going to stay in his car. He can't - there's nowhere for him to go. Officer Barthelemy gets off in case we are - our main concern is the driver. We follow the driver, he's going to run on foot now. He doesn't. He uh, turns around. I get out - after he hits my car, I get out of the car, and I walked closer towards his car. His car is boxed in. He probably - at this point after he hit my car, he slowed down to about I'd say 7 to 10 miles an hour. Still got a good click going. Backed into the van, but doesn't moved the van completely because he's in a smaller car. Hits the car and gaps a bit, and starts pushing the van back, and then pound - like, I mean, he hit it with a good force. Backs the van up on to the curb. And at this point, I'm out of my car, I'm drawing down on him, and I'm just standing directly probably - there's nowhere to go. So as soon as I exited my vehicle, I was literally on top of the guy. So draw down on him. Police, San Jose Police, turn your car off, put your hands up. There's
no way he could miss me. I got my sirens on my car still going full blare. The guy looks directly at me. As he's backing up in the car, he looks directly at me. And as I take one step forward, I'm probably - half of my body is where is driver's side headlight is. And he is able to push that car back far enough to where now there's - that car has been pushed to the sidewalk, he'll be able to fit just narrowly between our cars. So at that point, he looks at me and kind of looks for an escape route, puts it in drive, and just guns it. I jump out of the way. I had my gun in hand. I jump back. I fall down the ground. I come to rest on my - on my ass and I'm sitting there. I hopped up right away. And I'm thinking he's going to take off. At this point, I look up and Bruce is standing directly where the car is going. And uh - and that's pretty much all I see is Bruce. I see him standing directly where the car is going because he went around to the passenger side, and I went around to the driver's side.

Q: Okay.
A: $\quad$ And so as I get up, the car starts taking off again, and he just - I mean, there was - it couldn't have been more than inches on each side. Drives through. I ran back to my car, and uh, I'm thinking he's going to take off. And I don't even get two steps up because I'm just adrenaline - I stand up, I started to go back to my car thinking that, you know, I'm out. And Bruce started - I can't see him. So I'm thinking, I'm going to get my car and we're going to follow which - I'm pretty sure my car's 10-7 is down, but I don't know at the time. As soon as I turn around, I look towards my car, I hear a shot. I turned back around, and uh, the car was still in momentum going probably a good - at this time, the car is probably going 20, 25 , and it goes full in to a - like a pickup truck, a black pickup truck. Hits that truck. That truck jumps like, on the curb, hits another car. And uh, that's when Officer White - I ran over, Officer White is drawn down on the driver. The driver's door is open at this point. He drops down the driver. I see that he is going for the driver. I don't see what's going on then. I ran on the passenger side. The - there's a suspect in the passenger seat. He's kind of throwing hands up, but not really looking at us. Almost looked like he's PCP black side, like hey, you know, what's going on. I saw Officer Pifferini. Pifferini manipulates the door. I'm still out of a gun. Uh, he tells the suspect lay in the - the passenger seat, undo your seatbelt. The guy looks down. He's kind of you know, like, you know, staring - probably stare at us. The guy undo the - you know, undo the seatbelt, I think he listens to us. We pulled him out, put him down on the ground. I do a pat frisk. And uh, he had a lot - he had a lot of blood. At a later time, I think that was - it was right there, I thought it was him. Uh, rolled him around to see if he had any weapons. I thought he was injured. Hey, are you okay, do you need AMR, medical? And he just tells me no, I don't even know what's going on, but I'm not hurt. And I asked him about three or four times, are you sure? And I'm pretty sure, I thought it was him.

Q: Yeah.
A: And he's like, no, I'm not hurt at all. I asked do you have any weapons? No, no. We just probably had two shaved keys on. I pulled those out, take to my car turned down. Take to my car, do a full pat frisk. Sit him on the ground. And at that point, my sergeant, while we're doing this, um, I'm listening to sergeant's putting out traffic over the air, calling for any incoming closer units. And uh, that was right away, my sergeant called for uh, two uh, medic, fire and AMR. And the one was for Officer White because the vehicle accident, and one was for the uh, suspect who was shot. Um, at that point, the other units started coming in, and uh, it was just locked down. And from there, you know we kind of got pushed to a corner after we squared everything away with um, everybody okay, great. And everyone was fine. Officer White was fine. He had a huge knot on his head, but he's good. And all I had was I scratched my thumb, so I'm glad I didn't get ran over. If I wouldn't have jumped back, if I would have actually stood and stood my ground and draw down the guy, I would definitely go down, I guarantee it. There's no way I could have actually stayed there engaging the guy without me jumping probably - with my adrenaline, I probably jumped 5 feet average. Because I landed almost to where my car is at. Because when I stood up, I turned around, I was almost in my car door.

Q: $\quad$ Thank you for that detailed account. We're just going to ask you some follow questions, okay? Let's just sort of back up. I mean, um, during the course of uh, following the suspect's vehicle, um, could you tell how long that you were doing this sort of follow the leader?

Mm, I couldn't tell you exactly, but it was for a while.

I would say probably 20,25 minutes.
More than 30 minutes?
A: No, I wouldn't say 30 minutes. It was close to - I would say close to 20,25 minutes.

A: Like I said, he - it wasn't like he was going anywhere. It wasn't like he was trying to leave us. He was just driving. He was using his blinkers, he's stopping at stop signs. And every time we would think that we are burned, we pulled right behind him, he kind of like looked back at the car, and just keep going, 25,30 miles an hour, just not - I mean, it was like - it's like a game to
him, to a fact where you put back and like he had right away. He pulled back on the car minutes later and (unintelligible) decide to pay attention. So yeah, it was for a while. We took a lot of turns.

It almost looks like he wanted to flip around and maybe u-turn, but he realized, uh oh there's someone directly behind me. There's nowhere I can go, so he did, uh, like an $S$ turn. And when he did the $S$ turn, my sergeant was literally right there. And then he made the $S$ turn, and he just full gasses it. I mean, he - from the matter of the length of a car and a half, he got to a good 15 miles an hour. He cranks the car sideways and lands in the back of Officer White's vehicle.

So he did like an $S$ turn to kind of go around, and then hits Officer White.
Prior to that - sorry, let me back up. Um, the code 3 equipment did come on?
Oh yeah. We had all had to take our lights on.
Okay.
We were following him for probably a good - a good I'd say maybe 100,150 yards.
