Q: Okay. Um, was there one in the chamber plus the 30 in the magazine? Or was it just the 30 ?

A: Um, just the 30 and then take one off the top - top number.

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Okay. So it wasn't like what we do with our handguns where we load 15 , put one in the chamber, and then we load 15 ?

It would just then straight 30 ?
Just straight 30.
Okay, okay. And how many magazines did you have on you that day?
One in the weapon, three on my chest tray, and I'm trying to think if I had any more in my backpack. I don't think I did.

So a total of four.
All right. Um, are there any modifications or have any modifications been made to that weapon, um, from when you got it by you or anyone?

From when it was originally issued?
Yes.

Okay. What were those modifications?
Um, all authorized by the Range Masters. Uh, I had a class- one of the original classical stocks put back on.

I had what we refer to the Army carrying handle.
Okay.
On top, had that removed. It's got a flat rail.
Okay.

Uh, magazines all have, well that's not true. Yeah, magazines have a rubber mag pull.

To allow a quicker magazine change if you need to.

Oh, or at least so you don't drop it when you pull it out.

Um, don't believe there's any other modifications to it.
Okay. And you said those have all been okayed by the Range Master here at the Sheriff's Office?

Yes.
Okay. Um, okay. Back to the incident. At any time, um, during your encounter with the suspect, did you ever see - hear him make any, um, noises or did he ever say anything? Do you remember him saying anything or making any sou- noises, sounds?

A: The - the first time - the first time I heard any sound, talk, or noise come from him was when (Doug) (Unintelligible) and I had come in from the top...

...to try to find him. Um, as soon as I saw him, I started issuing commands. And I heard him, but I don't know if it was - I don't know if it was like a moaning or - or what, or if it was, um, like lung wheezing noises or something.

Okay.
Uh, but other than that I didn't - he didn't say anything.
Okay.
I never heard him say anything.
Okay. And when you hear the moaning or the wheezing, you said that's kind of as soon as, uh, you kind of see him for the first time (unintelligible) when you were and (Doug) (Unintelligible) are looking for him.

Mm-hm.

Uh, do you hear that the entire time you're up there, or does it stop at some point?

It was kind of intermittent. It wasn't all the time.
Okay. Okay.
Th- that's my recollection. I don't think he made that noise the whole time.
Okay. That's fine. Um, and when, uh, you fired your rounds at the suspect, what is your, uh, stance - or position? Are you standing, kneeling, prone?

Standing, um, a little crouched over. I was - I had my rifle at, uh, high ready at that time.

| Q: | Okay. And how did you see them? I mean were you looking through, like, up and above, or did you see it from where you were in your gun? How w- w... |
| A: | Well, I was pointing my rifle down at him, and when it got to the point where he had, well I - I thought he had what appeared to be too much control over that weapon ... |

And it looked like it was becoming, it was becoming a threat to me and (Doug). And I don't know who else might have been coming up the hill behind us, or whatever. Uh, that's when I decided to go ahead and fire.

Right.
(Unintelligible) issuing commands and I fired, um, and - and, um, you're talking about the impact area?

Yeah, I mean.
I believe I could see al- all three hit.
Okay.
I was looking down over the top of my, it was too close, it was like 15 feet away.

Right.
And so it's too close to use a four-power scope...
Okay.
A: ...and I was looking over the top of my rifle. Um, there is - there's the problem of pointing downhill. I start yelling. And I don't know if - I don't remember if I - if I said this in the original interview, as - as I was coming up to the top and I realized that I'm - I'm getting really close to this guy and I may have to, I may have to go ahead and engage him, uh, due to whatever threat that I might see. But I mean, at the time I hadn't decided that yet because he was still kind of moving around. I'd just seen the guy and I don't know who's in the creek right below us.

Mm-hm.
And so, as I knew I was getting really close, I yelled it out over the radio, "Danger close in the creeks. Danger close in the creek."

Okay.

A: Okay. Which meant the guys to get - get down there because it was such a steep slope, if one of my rounds had hit a rock or a hard piece of dirt, it could - it could ricochet.

Okay.

And so - but I had a mechanical lock set on my rifle.
Okay.
And the scope's way up here, the center bore is down here, and I was pointing at what I believed was kind of in the chest area. But if I aim too high, that makes the angle a whole lot closer to the side of the hill, more of a chance for ricocheting. So I was trying to aim it as low as I can, but still be effective.

Um, so the impact looked - looked like they were maybe above the belt or at the belt area.

Okay. And did, uh I remember during our first interview, you said at some point he kind of lifted his head off the ground. Did any other part of his body come off the ground?

A: Yeah, his left arm.

A: $\quad \mathrm{He}-$ he - he - he reached over like he was searching for the rifle, then come back over like this, and then - and then his hand kept going up, well, two or three times behind his head.

Mm-hm.

And because of the slope, you know (Doug) even said it before I did. He says - he said, "Be careful, he might have a pistol back there."

Right.
Because everything was going downhill.

Right.
And so if it fell out of his pants as he fell or dropped or - or whatever, I was worried that he might have a pistol back there.

Right.
And so, but his - his arm would go like this, and - and then come back over. He'd go back over and reach for the rifle, or at least what I believed that he was reaching for the rifle. Come back like this, and then he'd come back here like he was - like he was trying to grab something.

Okay.
And was always going kind of back to that same spot. But that's the only movement I saw.

Okay.
Other than him trying to lift his head once.
Okay, okay. So - so no other extremities other than the left arm, feet, legs, other, right arm?

I think - I think after I shot him...
Mm-hm.

I think one leg kind of slid back up. Kind of - kind of like - kind of pulled it up a little bit and set it back down.

Okay.
I don't think there was much movement from that time.
Okay. And that, would you - you demonstrated that with your right leg?
With my right - so you see - I think it was his left. I'm trying to get a picture of it. I think he - he moved his left leg back once and then set it back down again.

Okay. Okay. But you think that was after you fired your rounds or before?
