7 **INTERVIEW WITH**

8 **Q=Deputy Galaviz**

9 **A=**

10  
11  
12 Q: This is Deputy Galaviz, badge 2151, in regards to event 133200004B Bravo.  
13 The time is approximately 0050 hours - 50 hours. I'll be interviewing our  
14 reporting party, . All right, . Explain to  
15 me what led up to you calling the police tonight.  
16

17 A: Uh, my and fiancée, were here just watching TV. Uh, it was  
18 approximately 12 o'clock, maybe 12:05, uh, started hearing noise outside, so  
19 we paused the TV -- what we were doing -- so we could hear.  
20

21 Q: What kind of noises did you hear?  
22

23 A: Uh, just loud voices. I couldn't tell, so I went to pause the TV. So, we paused  
24 it and we can hear that it was, uh, (Andie) or (Andrea) from the front unit. She  
25 goes by (Andie) or (Andrea).  
26

27 Q: Wait. And you saw her?  
28

29 A: No, I could hear her.  
30

31 Q: Oh, you hear.  
32

33 A: The door was closed, but I can hear her voice clearly.  
34

35 Q: What - do you know her full name?  
36

37 A: Uh, (Andrea) Naharro -- N-A-H-A-R-R-O.  
38

39 Q: All right.  
40

41 A: Last name is Gionet. That's G-I-O...  
42

43 Q: G-I-O...  
44

45 A: ...N-E-T.

46  
47 Q: ...N-E-T? And Naharro, was that a - what's that name?  
48  
49 A: Uh, I don't know, this is just her full name that she goes by.  
50  
51 Q: Okay. And that is who you heard?  
52  
53 A: Yeah.  
54  
55 Q: Okay.  
56  
57 A: So, I heard (Andrea), uh, some yelling and then I heard, um, her - I heard her  
58 husband, , um, and they were arguing back and forth. Um, it sounded  
59 like he was outside the house, uh, knocking on the door, like maybe she had  
60 locked him out. Um...  
61  
62 Q: Do you know name?  
63  
64 A: Uh, I don't. I just know he goes by his last name is .  
65  
66 Q: I mean, just...  
67  
68 A: Uh, I don't know if is short for anything, though.  
69  
70 Q: Okay. No worries.  
71  
72 A: Um...  
73  
74 Q: But you heard both of them arguing.  
75  
76 A: Yeah, I heard both of them. I heard him telling her "It's , it's  
77 " and then she was actually shouting (Boston), that's our dog's name,  
78 and she takes care of him and she was shouting, "(Boston), (Boston)," and he  
79 was knocking on the door. Sounded like he couldn't get in the house and then  
80 I heard her say - not "I don't recognize you," um, "I don't know who you  
81 are," is what she said.  
82  
83 Q: Okay. So, the husband's knocking...  
84  
85 A: Yeah.  
86  
87 Q: ...and she says "I don't know who you are?"  
88  
89 A: Yeah. "I don't know who you are," which is really odd because she's had a  
90 weird last couple of days. I'll tell you the incidents, if you want, after this.

91  
92 Q: Well, just - right now, we'll go with what we have right now, what you, what  
93 this led up to and then if - after, I'll ask, okay?  
94  
95 A: Okay. And it was after she said the "I don't know who you are," uh, 15  
96 seconds later, maybe 30 seconds, I heard a car start, uh, which I'm assuming  
97 he drove away because the - there's a van that should be right there in that  
98 front spot and it's not there now. So, I'm guessing he got mad and he just - he  
99 left.  
100  
101 Q: Did you, at any point, look out and see anyone around?  
102  
103 A: Uh, no, not until, uh, a minute after maybe I heard the shots fired. So, it had  
104 been at least 20 minutes since the initial yelling started.  
105  
106 Q: Okay. So, you - you said how many minutes?  
107  
108 A: Uh...  
109  
110 Q: Twenty minutes?  
111  
112 A: Yes.  
113  
114 Q: From the initial yelling?  
115  
116 A: Uh, from the initial...  
117  
118 Q: Okay.  
119  
120 A: ...yelling to when I finally looked out.  
121  
122 Q: Okay. So, we'll go back to you heard the car...  
123  
124 A: Heard the car start, it was probably for quite a few minutes. Through the crack  
125 in the door, I could hear clearly the - like the car was running and he hadn't  
126 left yet and then, um, it had to be maybe five minutes and he left and it was  
127 quiet for a while. We kept our TV paused and then we started hearing her  
128 banging on things outside. No...  
129  
130 Q: You just heard banging or you heard her?  
131  
132 A: Actually, before that, um, so, he left, I went to go use the bathroom real quick  
133 and while I was in the bathroom, said that she was in front of our  
134 door. I don't know if she knocked. I couldn't hear if she knocked or not.  
135

- 136 Q: Who was in front of your door?  
137
- 138 A: Uh, (Andie), (Andrea). So, I don't know if she knocked or not, but she was in  
139 front of our door. And so I heard that, I came out and she was gone back down  
140 that way. That's when I start hearing banging, almost sounds like banging on  
141 a door or banging on this railing, I couldn't tell exactly what was being hit on  
142 out there. And then I heard what sounded like broken glass and that's what set  
143 me to call the police, because I thought that she was breaking into the middle  
144 apartment because the sound was so loud and so close that it sounded like it  
145 was right next door to us.  
146
- 147 Q: Okay. So, this is apartment, single-story with...  
148
- 149 A: It's A, B, C.  
150
- 151 Q: ...three - okay. And you're in C.  
152
- 153 A: I'm in C. She's in A.  
154
- 155 Q: And you thought - you heard the noises from B?  
156
- 157 A: It sounded like B because it was so loud.  
158
- 159 Q: And did you think she was breaking in or you didn't know what was...  
160
- 161 A: I thought she was breaking in because I - and then that's why I thought maybe  
162 she was pounding on the door, pounding on the door, and then she - then I  
163 thought she broke the glass. I thought she was going in. I didn't know if, um,  
164 in Apartment B - I didn't know if she was home or not.  
165
- 166 Q: Okay. She's the resident there?  
167
- 168 A: Yeah. So, I heard her dog barking which I mean, she leaves her dog alone  
169 when she's gone, so I thought it was just the dog, but still if somebody  
170 breaking in, that's - I mean, you know, everything going on before that was  
171 between them two, her and her husband, but once something starts getting  
172 broken into, uh, you know, that can't - it can't go past that. It can't go that far,  
173 you know?  
174
- 175 Q: Understandable. Do you know - so, you heard the breaking, you heard the dog  
176 barking, and then you called 911?  
177
- 178 A: Yeah.  
179
- 180 Q: And at any time between there, you hadn't looked outside yet?

181  
182 A: No, had not looked outside yet.  
183  
184 Q: Okay.  
185  
186 A: Um, I didn't want to because actually, uh, during the whole yelling - between  
187 the yelling starting and me calling the police, uh, told me that actually  
188 she was worried because a couple months ago she saw a gun in (Andie)'s  
189 house...  
190  
191 Q: Okay.  
192  
193 A: ...right - at like the table by the front door which her layout is exactly...  
194  
195 Q: So...  
196  
197 A: So, the table would be in the corner here. So, she said she saw a gun on the  
198 front table by the door.  
199  
200 Q: Okay. So, you're worried?  
201  
202 A: Yeah. And as soon as I started hearing the glass breaking, I was thinking I  
203 don't know what's going on in her head.  
204  
205 Q: Whose head?  
206  
207 A: (Andie)'s head.  
208  
209 Q: Okay.  
210  
211 A: So, I don't know what's going on in her head, does she have a gun, like...  
212  
213 Q: Hey, you - yeah, no, no worries.  
214  
215 A: ...and that's - that's when I called.  
216  
217 Q: Um, do you know if her - her and your neighbor, , the one in Unit B...  
218  
219 A: Yeah.  
220  
221 Q: ...does (Andie) and ever have any issues?  
222  
223 A: No.  
224  
225 Q: No?

226  
227 A: Uh, not at all.  
228  
229 Q: Okay.  
230  
231 A: We've never had any - nobody's ever had any issues with (Andie).  
232  
233 Q: Okay.  
234  
235 A: Uh, this is very, very out of character for her tonight. And she's only  
236 lived here about a month, maybe a little bit longer.  
237  
238 Q: Um...  
239  
240 A: So, it was pretty much during the entire phone call I was on with the dispatch,  
241 the operator, um, you know, they were just asking me, you know, what's  
242 going on. I told them it sounds like somebody's breaking into Apartment B at  
243 95 Cleveland Avenue. Um, she asked if I could see anything. I told them I  
244 can't see anything. I'm not looking outside.  
245  
246 Q: Um, do you know - did you see, um, (Andie) at all prior tonight? Did you  
247 have any interaction with her?  
248  
249 A: Today - uh, I have not seen her at all today. Um, saw her earlier. I  
250 mean, she'll fill you in on that, but that's not my - that's not my account, so.  
251  
252 Q: Yeah. I'll ask these same questions with your fiancée.  
253  
254 A: Yeah.  
255  
256 Q: Um, did you see the husband, correct? Did you see him at all today?  
257  
258 A: I didn't see him today.  
259  
260 Q: You didn't talk to him?  
261  
262 A: No.  
263  
264 Q: Do they argue often or...  
265  
266 A: Um, I think they've been having some issues lately, but nothing ever like this.  
267  
268 Q: You - you never see them get violent or anything like that? No?  
269  
270 A: No.

271  
272 Q: Um, do you know if (Andie) had been drinking at all or doing any drugs?  
273  
274 A: Um, she does do marijuana medicinally. She has MS. Um, she says that she  
275 doesn't drink. Although, three or four nights ago, she had been drinking,  
276 which that's the first time since I've lived here in - since February...  
277  
278 Q: Mm-hm.  
279  
280 A: ...that I've seen her drink. So, I don't know if she was drinking tonight.  
281  
282 Q: Okay. Um, and this behavior is not like (Andie) or is it...  
283  
284 A: Not like her at all. Very unlikely.  
285  
286 Q: Okay.  
287  
288 A: She's a sweet, very nice old lady.  
289  
290 Q: By old lady, what do you mean, how old would you describe her?  
291  
292 A: Uh, she's gotta be late 60s, maybe 70. I don't know exactly. I should know  
293 this. I've done a lot of paperwork for her and stuff.  
294  
295 Q: No worries. So, do you - you called, you're on the phone with the dispatcher  
296 and explain to me - because you had already said they asked you if you could  
297 see anything, you said you weren't looking out, you didn't see anything.  
298  
299 A: Yeah.  
300  
301 Q: And explain to me from that point.  
302  
303 A: Uh, they just, you know, they told me to, you know, make sure I stay on the  
304 line, tell them what's going on, what do I hear. I tell them I hear banging, I  
305 hear glass breaking...  
306  
307 Q: So...  
308  
309 A: ...and then there was points where it was like quiet for 30 seconds, a minute,  
310 and then noise - banging would start up again and - I mean, total, I was on the  
311 phone with the dispatcher 12 minutes. Uh, so, from the time I called and it  
312 was just banging and - I don't - I mean, she kept - every now and then, she  
313 would shout out, "(Boston)," but I don't know what...  
314  
315 Q: Um, and (Boston) is who?

316  
317 A: The dog. (Boston)'s our dog.  
318  
319 Q: Your dog?  
320  
321 A: Yeah.  
322  
323 Q: Um, I know when I first walked in prior to starting this, you said she watches  
324 your dog?  
325  
326 A: Yeah.  
327  
328 Q: Okay.  
329  
330 A: Uh, she - we crate him - I don't know if you see our crate in the kitchen, but  
331 we crate him when we leave for work and it's like he has major separation  
332 anxiety, so (Boston) will start to howl and bark when he's...  
333  
334 Q: Mm-hm.  
335  
336 A: ...in his crate and she has a key to our house and she lets him out, lets him go  
337 to the bathroom. Sometimes she keeps him and like just watches him for, you  
338 know, a few hours until her husband gets home and then she puts him back.  
339  
340 Q: Okay. Um, do you know if she has a key to unit?  
341  
342 A: I don't think so.  
343  
344 Q: You don't think so. Okay.  
345  
346 A: Yeah.  
347  
348 Q: Do you know why she would be yelling (Boston)?  
349  
350 A: I have no idea.  
351  
352 Q: Oh. Okay.  
353  
354 A: With everything, it's just so out of character tonight, I have no idea why.  
355  
356 Q: You don't know, you've never seen her behave like this.  
357  
358 A: No.  
359  
360 Q: Okay. So, this is all going on, you're on - with dispatch. You continue to hear



361 banging, yelling, she's yelling out "(Boston)," and at what point do you know  
362 deputies arrive and lead me from this point on to what you hear or saw.

363  
364 A: It was about 10 minutes into the phone call, so probably about 12:15, maybe  
365 12:20 at this point. I didn't get a good notice at when everything started.

366  
367 Q: Hmm, no worries.

368  
369 A: Uh, so, I hear yelling outside and I'm thinking - hoping that , her  
370 husband, came back and that maybe this can get resolved, because I already  
371 know that deputies are on the way and I don't want things to escalate like they  
372 did.

373  
374 Q: So, when you heard the voices you thought had come home.

375  
376 A: I was hoping. I didn't know that yet, I was hoping it was him. And dispatcher  
377 informed me that, uh, officers were just arriving on the scene and I hear  
378 yelling back and forth. I couldn't clearly hear words being said, but I could  
379 hear yelling. Uh, dispatch told me that they had just got on the scene and that  
380 there's a woman with a knife and not even like five seconds later, I hear three  
381 shots fired.

382  
383 Q: Okay. So, dispatch advised you...

384  
385 A: Yeah.

386  
387 Q: ...that there was a woman outside with a...

388  
389 A: Woman with a knife, yeah. There were shots fired. I told dispatch that I heard  
390 shots and then...

391  
392 Q: How many shots did - would you say you heard?

393  
394 A: Three I believe.

395  
396 Q: Three. And can you describe those? What they'd sound like? Have you heard  
397 gunshots?

398  
399 A: Um...

400  
401 Q: And you said three?

402  
403 A: Three shots, yeah. It was more of like - not like a bang, but more of like a loud  
404 popping sound. I mean, I've never...

405

406 Q: And...  
407  
408 A: ...been in a shooting range. I've never shot guns. I've never heard guns fired,  
409 so...  
410  
411 Q: But you did recognize it as definitive?  
412  
413 A: Yeah.  
414  
415 Q: Okay.  
416  
417 A: Because right after that it - the yelling and everything, it stopped. It was quiet  
418 and...  
419  
420 Q: Okay. So, yelling stopped after the three shots?  
421  
422 A: Yeah. And dispatch told me the officers were on the scene and that they  
423 would be calling me back if they needed any more info and that's when we  
424 hung up. And...  
425  
426 Q: Did they tell you stay in your house or any other instructions?  
427  
428 A: Uh, just while everything was going on, they told me to stay in the house and  
429 stay on the line with them and it wasn't until things were, I guess, clear, if you  
430 would say it that way, then - that's when she told me that everything was all  
431 right or that - she told me, uh, that they'll be calling me back if, uh, they  
432 needed any more information.  
433  
434 Q: Okay.  
435  
436 A: And then me and my fiancée were just standing here just assuming the worst  
437 from...  
438  
439 Q: And you guys were standing here in your living room?  
440  
441 A: In the corner by the door and she was right next to me, and we were standing  
442 there for not even a minute and we hear, uh, the deputies walking on the deck  
443 here and that's when I unlocked the door, looked out and they were already  
444 back down in the driveway.  
445  
446 Q: Okay. So you heard footsteps.  
447  
448 A: Yeah. And they were already back down in the driveway and I looked out and  
449 that's when I could see (Andie) laying there on the ground.  
450

451 Q: Okay. You heard footsteps, looked out, and you saw the deputies?  
452

453 A: Yeah. I mean, they were right down at the end of the driveway.  
454

455 Q: And you said you saw (Andie), where?  
456

457 A: Laying on the ground. I mean, I'm not sure if she was still laying in the same  
458 spot when you got here, but she was laying on the ground, face up, her hands  
459 were on her chest.  
460

461 Q: Face up and hands were on her chest?  
462

463 A: Uh, yes.  
464

465 Q: And both of them or...  
466

467 A: Either chest, maybe stomach...  
468

469 Q: That's fine.  
470

471 A: ...somewhere with both her hands.  
472

473 Q: Both her hands are up.  
474

475 A: Yeah. And...  
476

477 Q: Did you see a knife?  
478

479 A: I did not see a knife. Uh, I couldn't see far enough. Me and my fiancée started  
480 walking down there, then one of the deputies told us to go back and - so we  
481 came - we were standing right back in front of our door.  
482

483 Q: So, you were walking towards (Andie) where she was laying?  
484

485 A: Yeah, we got as far as, uh, Apartment B's front door.  
486

487 Q: Okay. How - how close to (Andie) do you think Apartment - Unit B is?  
488

489 A: From the door to...  
490

491 Q: Yeah, to where you stopped...  
492

493 A: ...from where we were standing?  
494

495 Q: ...and you saw her to where she was laying, how close do you think that was?

496  
497 A: Uh, maybe 60 feet, 50 feet.  
498  
499 Q: Fifty to 60?  
500  
501 A: Uh, I would say 50 feet.  
502  
503 Q: All right. Yeah, just...  
504  
505 A: I'm trying to - I'm trying to picture it all. I used to play football, you know.  
506  
507 Q: I'm staying with you. I did the same, but, you know, it's an estimation. I'm  
508 not expecting...  
509  
510 A: Yeah.  
511  
512 Q: ...you to give exact dimensions. It's just I try and paint picture with my report.  
513  
514 A: Yeah.  
515  
516 Q: Um, to show how close you were to hey, you did see hands on a chest, you  
517 were able to properly identify yes, that was (Andie). You know for sure?  
518  
519 A: Yeah.  
520  
521 Q: Okay. And when deputies stopped you from getting closer to where the  
522 incident occurred and - what did you do?  
523  
524 A: Uh, we turned around and walked back and we stood in front of our door.  
525  
526 Q: Did you come inside or you stayed outside?  
527  
528 A: We stayed outside and, uh, I don't remember if we came inside and then the  
529 deputies came to us or if we were standing outside our door and they came up  
530 to us to ask questions. We were standing outside still and they came up to us.  
531  
532 Q: And when they came up, did they have you come in and, you know, stay  
533 seated and then...  
534  
535 A: Yeah, they wanted us to come inside.  
536  
537 Q: And is that when I came up and - I know you guys were probably in here for...  
538  
539 A: It was a few minutes...  
540

541 Q: Five...

542

543 A: ...five minutes or so. I mean, they did, uh, just asking what happened, not as

544 in-dept as you're doing right now.

545

546 Q: Oh, yeah, I understand. We get sometimes just quick - what we call synopsis

547 to see what's going on. Um, do you know of any details that I should know or

548 that you may have forgotten or I forgot to ask?

549

550 A: Um, regarding just the incident, no.

551

552 Q: No?

553

554 A: Uh, but I mean, I had mentioned that there was a couple things. Uh,

555 will tell you about one that happened a little bit earlier, but last night, I got

556 home from work. This is the first...

557

558 Q: And last night being...

559

560 A: Um...

561

562 Q: What date would you give that?

563

564 A: Let me see. I was getting home from work Thursday. It was after midnight, so

565 it would actually be early Friday morning.

566

567 Q: So, the 15th?

568

569 A: Uh, yes. Friday, November 15, about 1 o'clock in the morning.

570

571 Q: Okay.

572

573 A: So, I was getting home from work - so, I was getting home from work and I

574 parked my car. I parked in the driveway. When I lock it, the horn honks and I

575 walk past her door and she comes barging out, which she's done it a couple

576 times, but she just seemed a little off, but she came barging out her door

577 looking down towards the driveway. I was already past her door, so she

578 wasn't looking at me. And I - so, I was like a few feet past her door and I said,

579 "What's up?" And she's like, "Oh, I thought somebody was messing with the

580 cars." I'm like, "No," you know, "It's just me getting home," like - and I was

581 like, "Are you okay?" And she's like, "Yeah, sorry, just thought somebody

582 was out here messing with the car," then she went back inside. But it was just

583 the way she came out, like it was just a little out of character and especially

584 for her to be awake at 1 o'clock in the morning. She's never up that late. And

585 then, uh, it was just weird and I told about that and she said it was

586 weird, too. And then there was her thing. I don't know if you want me to tell  
587 her or leave that for her to tell you.  
588

589 Q: I'll get it from her. Um, you know, I'd hate for you to miss out some portions  
590 or it be changed. Um, but if, um, I will see and ask her. Any other emphasis  
591 where - and you said that was just on Friday. Early in the morning, correct?  
592 1AM, around that?  
593

594 A: Yeah.  
595

596 Q: Did you notice anything unusual prior to that or you ever have...  
597

598 A: No, not at all. I mean, aside from like three or four days ago when she was  
599 drinking, I already told you about that, and she doesn't - she doesn't drink in -  
600 in the - how many months...  
601

602 Q: And you...  
603

604 A: In the - in the nine months that I've known her.  
605

606 Q: And you saw her drinking?  
607

608 A: Yes, I saw her drinking and she offer - or she asked if we wanted to drink with  
609 her and we told her later on and then we never did because, you know, she just  
610 - we felt it was best to just leave her alone because we felt like she was going  
611 through something because...  
612

613 Q: Yeah.  
614

615 A: ...she doesn't drink. That's the thing. Like something had to have been really  
616 bugging her I think for her to - for her to drink.  
617

618 Q: So, do you - did you ask her why she had started drinking or asked her to say,  
619 hey, I thought you never drink?  
620

621 A: No.  
622

623 Q: No? Okay. So - but it was just something that came up to you thinking that's  
624 unusual?  
625

626 A: Yeah, and she - she had actually asked me to babysit her. She's like, "Oh, I'll  
627 pay you and everything." And I'm like, "No, you know, don't worry about  
628 paying me." And she's like, "Yeah, just make sure I don't - make I don't do  
629 anything stupid."  
630

631 Q: Okay.  
632  
633 A: And, uh, I mean, from what I could tell, I mean, she didn't do anything stupid  
634 that night. I mean, she even came over and gave me her keys. Five minutes  
635 later, she gave me her spare keys, so she won't leave anywhere. And I mean,  
636 aside from that, I mean, it was a normal night. She kept quiet out there and...  
637  
638 Q: So, she won't do anything stupid. She didn't elaborate on that?  
639  
640 A: No.  
641  
642 Q: And you said she gave you her keys?  
643  
644 A: Yeah.  
645  
646 Q: Car keys and house keys?  
647  
648 A: Uh, yeah, from what I can tell. I mean, there's a bunch of keys.  
649  
650 Q: Oh, you don't. I won't even - I'll just say keys. A bunch of keys.  
651  
652 A: Yeah.  
653  
654 Q: What would you say a bunch?  
655  
656 A: Uh...  
657  
658 Q: Like five, ten?  
659  
660 A: Five to ten keys.  
661  
662 Q: All right.  
663  
664 A: And that was on two different sets as well both containing the same amount of  
665 keys.  
666  
667 Q: Okay. Um, when did this occur? Was it recently or...  
668  
669 A: Yeah, this was, um, I can't remember exact - it was like three or four nights  
670 ago. I don't remember exactly what night, uh, what day it was.  
671  
672 Q: Okay. And then it was just odd you remember?  
673  
674 A: Yeah, it was just a little weird because she doesn't - I mean, she doesn't drink.  
675

676 Q: Okay. Um, and - I'll just ask this one again. Is there anything else you could  
677 remember about today or something that you've - saw?  
678

679 A: No. That's it I think.  
680

681 Q: No? Okay. So, we'll - I'll be ending my interview with you, the recording. If  
682 at any time you do remember something because you and your fiancée are just  
683 going to swap places, so you guys take any time. You need something from  
684 us, let us know. You need a break or you remember something I should know.  
685

686 A: Okay.  
687

688 Q: Let me know at any moment, okay? All right. This concludes the interview.  
689
